> Isaiah 53:10-11; Hebrews 4:14-16; Mark 10:35-45

James and John had ambition; nothing is wrong with that! Their career advancement depended on the Messiah; they wanted to be his chief cabinet members. But Jesus' "kingdom" was not what they expected.

His "kingdom" meant that God was the ruler of every aspect of their lives. To "drink the cup" didn't mean tasting his food to see if it was poisoned; it meant to "share in his suffering."

In short, Jesus tells them that true greatness means service to others. The CEO in the kingdom of heaven is one who serves the needs of all others. No one wants to suffer; no one in his right mind likes to suffer. But if we stand for what is right and true, we shall suffer!

The first reading tells of the "Suffering Servant." If we stand for righteousness, we will win in the end, for God will not abandon us. Think of how wonderful life would be if every business, every industry, every profession, and every occupation were guided by these principles!

Sad to say, we live in a world which is ruthlessly ruled by the market, by self-seekers, by those who care little for truth or virtue or for family or for human dignity. If we oppose the "system" we shall suffer.

Jesus showed the way. He is our high priest. He knows what we endure when we are loyal to Christian virtues. Let us, then, confidently approach the throne of his grace and put our trust in him. He won't let us down; in the long run, he – and we – will win.

29TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Teacher, we want you to do whatever we ask of you. (Mark 10:35)

This sounds like a bold yet childish demand to our ears. It is easy to hear the arrogance that the other Apostles heard coming out of the mouths of their comrades in arms. Yet, to James and John it was a reasonable and valid request. After all James knew the Law better than any of the Apostles, and John was the beloved. The brothers followed Jesus with fervor and intense passion so it would be right and just for them to sit at Jesus' right and left when He came into his kingdom.

This is a great story in the making, but Jesus stops all of them in their tracks. The other Apostles are only angry that they did not ask Jesus for the prime seating first. They certainly wanted to be at the top of the list of who is the most important among Jesus' followers. But Jesus has a response that no one expected. The most important of all must be the servant of all and must become the slave of all. This is totally different from anything they have ever heard before. Suddenly the Apostles are faced with a new way of life that was not what they expected and definitely wasn't what they were looking for.

So much of this Gospel relates to our own lives. How easy it is to hear the arrogance or bitterness in someone else's voice, yet we do not hear it in ourselves. How resistive can we become to seeing God in ways we did not expect. To see God in ways that challenge our comfort zone. Are we truly open to being a servant to others? Are we willing to be a slave to those in need in order to follow Christ?

One hundred fifty days ago I was ordained a priest of Jesus Christ. I do believe that in my time of discernment, before I quit my job and entered seminary, I was very open to the idea of what I had envisioned being a priest would be like. I had served in many roles in the parish and as I was preparing to be ordained to the permanent diaconate, I thought I was pretty ready. After three years of study at St. Meinrad the day came for ordination to the priesthood and I was given my first assignment as parochial vicar at St. Francis Solanus in Quincy.

Arriving just over 100 days ago, I wish to express how amazed I am in how much bigger God's plan has been than I could have ever imagined. We have already been through a lot together with funerals, parties, Eucharistic procession, the beginning of school, and many daily and Sunday Masses. God has certainly blessed me. So many of you have reached out to ensure that I was welcomed and well, very well, taken care of. I am so thankful for all of the ministries that are a part of our parish.

A shout out to the sacristans who set up and take down for Mass. This allows me to fulfill my other roles during the day. To our servers who truly are serving the rest of us as we come to worship. Our music ministry, ushers, greeters, the bread ministry, food pantry, quilters, men's groups, ladies' groups, saint study, OCIA. Prayer is a constant part of the day at St. Francis Solanus. I am amazed when I am able to go on a call for an anointing that God's plan allows me to be so present to people who need to know Jesus is near.

Thank you for welcoming me to be a part of your parish and allowing me to call it home. It is a privilege to serve as a priest and to be allowed to bring Christ's sacramental presence to you. May Almighty God always conform our wills to His and may we serve one another with sincerity of heart.


Job Opening
