From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Twenty-Seventh Sunday of Ordinary Time. In the First Reading from the Book of Genesis, God creates a suitable partner for man, forming woman from his rib. In the Second Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews, the author writes about how Christ was, for a little while, made lower than the angels and therefore is not ashamed to call us brothers. In the Gospel from St. Mark, Jesus answers the Pharisees' question regarding the legality of divorce and reiterates the permanence of the marriage bond.

Conjugal love, lived in fidelity to God's original plan, is to be one of the principal manifestations of the Kingdom proclaimed by Jesus. Through Baptism into Christ, we join with Him in having one and the same Father.

God desires for us to love and be loved, as He loves. From the very beginning, the Lord made us to not be alone: we were created for relationship with Him and with one another. There is something truly worthy of awe - awesome - in knowing that God, the Creator of the Universe and all things, desires for us to love and be loved, as he loves. We are not just His Creation, we are His children. His only Son

is our brother. The Kingdom belongs to us, if we embrace it with the childlike wonder it deserves.

-LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

-Monday, October 7 - Memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary; Liturgical Color: White.

"Quotes: One day, through the Rosary and the Scapular, Our Lady will save the world.

The Rosary is my favorite prayer. A marvelous prayer! Marvelous in its simplicity and its depth. -Saint John Paul II

The Rosary is a priceless treasure inspired by God. -Saint Louis de Montfort

The Rosary is the most excellent form of prayer and the most efficacious means of attaining eternal life. It is the remedy for all our evils, the root of all our blessings. There is no more excellent way of praying. -Pope Leo XIII

In the twelfth and thirteenth centuries, the Albigensian heresy was flourishing in southern France. The Albigensians were Christian dualists who believed the Old Testament God was the source of the material world, which was evil, and the New Testament God was the source of the spiritual realm that was good. They rejected the sacraments and promoted extreme asceticism as a way of rejecting the material world.

In 1203, Saint Dominic was traveling through southern France on a diplomatic mission when he encountered this grave heresy. In the two decades to follow, he devoted himself wholeheartedly to rooting out this heresy through preaching and debates. Legend has it that at some point, frustrated with the difficulties he was facing in that mission, he retreated for a few days of prayer and fasting to beseech Our Lady for guidance. Our Lady appeared to him, giving him the Rosary, revealing the mysteries to be meditated upon during the fifteen decades, and exhorting him to preach the mysteries and to pray the decades as a spiritual weapon. The

word “Rosary” comes from the Latin *rosarium*, which means “rose garden.” Each Hail Mary is a spiritual rose; together, they make up the garden of roses. Saint Dominic did as Our Lady instructed him and became quite successful in converting the heretics.

Today’s feast of Our Lady of the Rosary has its roots in a feast named Our Lady of Victory. In the late sixteenth century, the Muslims of the Ottoman Empire were expanding into southeastern Europe and the Mediterranean region. In 1571, Pope Pius V, who was a Dominican, formed an alliance between the Papal States, Spain, Venice, and several other smaller Christian states, called the Holy League, in order to stop Ottoman aggression. On October 7 of that year, the Holy League confronted the Ottoman navy in the Mediterranean, and the pope called upon all of Europe to pray the Rosary for victory. Victory was achieved. In gratitude, Pope Pius V instituted the Feast of Our Lady of Victory to be celebrated on the first Sunday of October every year. Two years later, Pope Gregory XIII changed the name to the Feast of the Holy Rosary. In 1671, the feast was extended to all of Spain, and in 1716, after another important victory against the Muslims, the feast was extended to the entire Church. In 1913, Pius X changed the date from the first Sunday in October to October 7 to preserve the Sunday celebration. Today, this feast is celebrated under the title of Our Lady of the Rosary as a mandatory memorial on the Roman Calendar.

Though war is always gravely unfortunate and should be avoided if at all possible, defense of one’s family and nation is a moral duty when an unjust aggressor attacks. In this case, prayer is the greatest weapon of war, and after the Mass, the Rosary is the greatest prayer to be prayed.

In addition to physical war to protect one’s nation, the Rosary is among the greatest spiritual weapons to fight against every form of evil. Often, even during times of peace, spiritual chaos reigns. Today, due to instant worldwide communication technologies, we are well aware of the many spiritual evils that plague societies and peoples everywhere: wars, corruption, immoral living, flamboyant sins of the flesh, murders, thefts, crimes of hate, moral decay, poverty, and so much more. Rather than just criticizing and condemning such evils, praying the Rosary for those intentions is the best way to combat them.

Prayer: Our Lady of the Rosary, you entrusted this holy prayer to Saint Dominic, and through him, to the world. You are always attentive to the prayers of the Rosary and never fail to pour forth God’s grace in response. Please pray that I will more deeply comprehend the Rosary’s power and will never fail in my duty to pray it every day. Our Lady of the Rosary, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.”

-Wednesday, October 9 - Optional memorials of St. Denis, Bishop and Companions, Martyrs and St. John Leonardi, Priest.

St. Denis and Companions: Lived Third Century; Patron Saint of France, Paris, and possessed people; Invoked against frenzy, headaches, hydrophobia, rabies, and strife; Liturgical Color: Red.

“Quote: After this, they were brought before the judge and subjected to further torture. Then, the judge ordered the beheading of all three of them—Denis, Rusticus, and Eleutherius—while they were professing their faith in the Holy Trinity. This execution took place near the Temple of Mercury, and they were beheaded using three axes. Immediately after, the body of St. Denis stood up and carried his own head in his arms. Guided by an angel, he walked about two miles from the execution site, known as the Hill of the Martyrs, to the location where he now rests, which he chose through divine guidance. -The Golden Legend.

Saint Denis and his companions were early clerics, missionaries, and martyrs. Though they had a powerful effect upon the people of their time, their more profound effect came afterwards as faithful Christians were inspired by their witness and enthralled by their stories. Regardless of whether some details of their martyrdom are more legend than fact, their stories are inspirational. Though most historians deny the historicity of Saint Denis carrying his head, God is All-Powerful and could easily perform such a miracle. The greater miracle, however, is the witness they gave and the forgiveness this legend conveys.

As we honor Saint Denis and his companions, ponder the depth of your own faith and how willing you are to go, so as to embrace martyrdom rather than sin. Ponder, also, whether you are willing to forgive anyone and everyone who has sinned against you. These are the central messages of Saint Denis’

legend. Allow those messages to penetrate your own soul.

Prayer: Saint Denis and companions, you courageously traveled to an unknown land, to an unknown people, to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ. You did so with prayer and trust in God's divine guidance. God used you during your lives and continues to use you in your deaths. Please pray for me, that all that I am and all that I do will be done solely for the glory of God and the salvation of souls. Saints Denis, Rusticus, and Eleutherius, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You."

St. Leonardi: Lived 1541-1609; Patron Saint of pharmacists; Canonized by Pope Pius XI on April 17, 1938; Liturgical Color: White.

"Quote: Those who want to work for moral reform in the world must seek the glory of God before all else. Because he is the source of all good they must wait for his help, and pray for it in this difficult and necessary undertaking. They must then present themselves to those they seek to reform, as mirrors of every virtue and as lamps on a lamp-stand. Their upright lives and noble conduct must shine before all who are in the house of God. In this way they will gently entice the members of the Church to reform instead of forcing them, lest, in the words of the Council of Trent, they demand of the body what is not found in the head, and thus upset the whole order of the Lord's household.

They will be like skilled physicians taking great pains to dispose of all the diseases that afflict the Church and require a cure. They will ready themselves to provide suitable remedies for each illness. -Letter to Pope Paul V, from Saint John Leonardi.

Saint John Leonardi was inspired by the Holy Spirit to assist in the reform of the Church and to foster a deeply personal relationship with Christ, especially through adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, frequent Communion, and good catechesis. It often happens that the work the Holy Spirit inspires in one person is then opposed by those who do not listen to the promptings of that same Spirit. The life of Saint John Leonardi displays a prime example of this conflict. His perseverance throughout lends more credence to his holiness and divine mission.

As we honor this religious founder and confessor, ponder the fact that God's will is not always embraced by the world with open arms. Therefore, when we act as instruments

of God's will and Truth, others will not always embrace us. This opposition can, at times, lead to discouragement. As you ponder Saint John's life today, allow his fidelity and perseverance in the face of persecution to inspire you to press on with the mission God has given to you. Reject discouragement, pray for courage, and seek to implement God's will in your life.

Prayer: Saint John Leonardi, you came to know Christ in an intimate and personal way and desired to share your devotion with others. Though your mission was not warmly welcomed by those who opposed the Holy Spirit, God used you, nonetheless, to bring about much good. Please pray for me, that I will never allow opposition to hinder my fidelity to God's will, but will be inspired by your own courage in the face of persecution and will follow in your example. Saint John Leonardi, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You."

Friday, October 11 - Optional memorial of Saint John XXIII, Pope. Lived 1881-1963; Patron Saint of papal delegates; Canonized by Pope Francis on April 27, 2014; Liturgical Color: White.

"Quote: Since the Lord chose me, unworthy as I am, for this great service, I feel I have no longer any special ties in this life, no family, no earthly country or nation, nor any particular preferences with regard to studies or projects, even good ones. Now, more than ever, I see myself only as the humble and unworthy "servant of God and servant of the servants of God." The whole world is my family. This sense of belonging to everyone must give character and vigor to my mind, my heart and my actions. -Saint John XXIII, journal entry.

As we honor this holy pastor of the universal Church, ponder the amazing fact that God could use a poor, humble, and simple man in such a profound way. As a divine institution, God always has and always will guide the Church through the Vicar of Christ. Sinful and weak though even popes are, God's grace suffices where human weakness is present. Pray for the pope today, and know that he is God's gift to the Church in our day and age.

Prayer: Saint John XXIII, you were raised in humble conditions, were formed well in the faith, responded to God's grace, and were used in powerful ways that have had a profound effect upon the Church and world. Please pray for me, that I will always remain faithful to God's will so that He can use me in the

particular ways He chooses. Saint John XXIII, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You."

-DEATH ANNOUNCEMENT - Please pray for the repose of the soul of Vivian Schulte who died on Monday, September 30. Vivian is the mother of one of our Diocesan Priests, Fr. Mark Schulte, Pastor of St. Mary in Pittsfield and St. Mark in Winchester. Additionally, Vivian has a number of other children including Claudia Coggeshall from St. Thomas and Aaron who is a Trappist Monk at the Abbey of Gethsemani in Trappist, KY.

The death of one's mother is difficult and especially so for many priests and so as you keep Mrs. Schulte in your prayers, please pray also for Fr. Schulte and all of Vivian's family in this time of sorrow.

On a personal note, I've known Vivian my entire life. My own mother and Vivian were friends from years ago. Priests' mothers tend to have a special connection with one another. I know mom and Vivian talked many years ago about my own Vocation to the Priesthood and as mother's do, both found ways of "encouraging" that Vocation without forcing it. I recall (and still have) a letter from Vivian's son, Aaron, from when I was in high school some thirty years ago and thinking about the Priesthood. One thing he wrote in the letter that I recall to this day was to "always go to and stay close to our Blessed Mother...she will never let you down." Gosh that is so true!...I have always had a special devotion to her! Additionally, I also served for Fr. Mark's First Mass of Thanksgiving at St. John the Baptist in Quincy some twenty-seven years ago. Without any doubt these two mothers, Vivian and my own, played a big but simple part in bringing this all about. It sounds simple and it is but God is simple. Though it took me a while to enter Seminary, through these simple things and certainly with fervent prayer from both mom and Vivian and many others, my Priestly Vocation was nurtured. Never underestimate the simplest of things that you do or say.

All mothers are vital and indispensable. They are given to us by God. Their role as mothers is the greatest role they have. Mothers, please hear and know this every single day of your life. Along with fathers, they form holy families and bring about good and holy Vocations. The mothers of priests are pretty incredible. I don't just say that because of my own mother. Look at the Mother of THE High Priest, Jesus Christ, whose

Priesthood every other priest shares in. She is a great model for all of us. Take a moment now and every single day to pray for your own mother and for all mothers.

Eternal Rest, grant unto Vivian, O Lord, and let Perpetual Light shine upon her. May her soul and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.
