St. Thomas – Epiphany Party - Advent is a time of preparation. So too are we preparing for our parish Christmas celebration. It will be on Sunday, January 5, the feast of the Epiphany. More details and sign-up sheets will be coming. For now, mark your calendars! Bring the whole family on Sunday, January 5 after our 10:00 a.m. Mass.

From the Pastor's Desk

Today the Church celebrates the Third Sunday of Advent which is traditionally known as Gaudete Sunday, so-called from the first word of the Antiphon at the Introit. Gaudete means "Rejoice" and sets a tone of joyful expectation for the Lord's Second Coming and the celebration of His Birth as does the permitted rose-colored vestments for this day.

"Among those within the crowds who were asking Saint John the Baptist this question were tax collectors, soldiers and ordinary people. John gave an answer to them all, first telling them to turn away from the sins that they struggled with the most. Sin takes on many forms and often is closely associated with our daily duties in life. Some sins are sins of commission, meaning sins we commit by an intentional act. Some sins are those of omission, meaning a lack of certain virtues or a failure to do what we ought to do.

After addressing the particular sins that those in the crowds were struggling with, John then turns their attention to Christ. He states to them that "one mightier than I is coming" and that "He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire." In other words, John was giving the people a twofold command. First, work to overcome sin. And second, turn your eyes to Him Who is coming to you. Repenting from sin is not enough. Once we repent, we must then fill the void within our souls with the presence of Christ.

Advent, just like Lent, is an important time within our liturgical year to heed these messages. Though it's true that we must work to overcome sin and turn to Christ every day of the year, God knows we need a special time each year when we give concerted effort to these spiritual endeavors. So, before Advent passes you by, heed the words of the Baptist and take some time to examine your conscience thoroughly. Perhaps use a detailed list of the Ten Commandments or the Seven Capital Sins. Once you do that, seek out an opportunity to celebrate the Sacrament of

Reconciliation. Doing so is essential to a fruitful Advent season.

Once you thoroughly repent of the sins you struggle with the most right now, turn to the Savior of the World with special attentiveness to the miracle of the Incarnation this Advent. Spend time adoring the God Who came to us in the form of a little child. Meditate on this Gift. Gaze at a nativity scene prayerfully. Read the Scripture passages about the birth of Christ. Close your eyes and imagine yourself there at His birth.

Reflect, today, upon this twofold exhortation from John and apply it to your Advent preparations. Cleanse your soul in a special way from all sin this Advent. Then prayerfully ponder and meditate upon the reality we are preparing to celebrate. As John says, allow the Christ Child to truly "baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire" through your deepening devotion and prayer this Advent.

Prayer: My dear Jesus, please help me to see my sins as You see them. Help me to be attentive to every sinful action I commit and even those smaller sins of omission. As I ponder my sin, please draw me to Your mercy and grace so that I can then open the eyes of my soul more deeply to see You and to adore You more completely this Advent. Jesus, I trust in You."

-LITURGICAL CELEBRATIONS THIS WEEK:

-Saturday, December 21 – Optional memorial of St. Peter Canisius, Priest and Doctor of the Church. Lived 1521–1597; Patron Saint of the Catholic press, Germany, and writers of catechisms; Canonized and declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope Pius XI on May 21, 1925;

Liturgical Color: Violet.

"As we honor this great apostle of the Catholic faith, ponder the reasons for his success. He loved Christ, and he loved God's people. He didn't teach with arrogance or pride. He wasn't harsh or heavy-handed. Instead, he won hearts as he won minds, gently but clearly leading people back to the faith, introducing them to the Person of Christ, and showing them the way to Heaven. Seek Saint Peter Canisius' intercession today, praying that you, too, will become an evangelist in his mold. Commit yourself to sharing the Gospel with compassion, while never wavering from the truth.

Prayer: Saint Peter Canisius, God called you into His service at a crucial time when the

Church in Germany and all of Europe was experiencing confusion and was in need of reform. Your deep faith in Christ, coupled with your theological knowledge, enabled you to be a holy instrument of conversion for countless people for centuries afterward. Please pray for me, that I will learn from your example and become an apostle to those to whom I am sent. Saint Peter Canisius, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You."

-ADVENT – We remain in the Season of Advent and I encourage you to remain mindful of this Season each day. Advent calls us to prepare, to quiet our minds and our hearts as we reflect on God's presence and His coming. In the busyness of life and especially in the hustle and bustle of these days leading up to Christmas, let us remain vigilant to the Season of Advent.

-CALENDARS – 2025 calendars are now available in the back of both churches while they last. Hendricker Funeral Home in Mt. Sterling provides these calendars for our parishes. I thank them for continuing to provide these for our parishioners. If you see Jamie or Tracy, please thank them or send them a note thanking them for the calendars.

There is just one style this year...Feasts and Saints. These are excellent calendars to have as they give a lot of information concerning Liturgical celebrations and norms.

Feel free to take one for yourself and/or for anyone you know who may be homebound or in a nursing home or otherwise unable to get one from the church. We are also planning to send one home with each St. Mary School Family as well.

-CHRISTMAS FLOWER DONATIONS - You can still make a contribution toward the flowers for Christmas, St. Thomas parishioners should have an envelope for this in the regular set of envelopes (or use your own envelope and mark it "Christmas Flowers). For Holy Family, please place your contribution in an envelope marked "Christmas Flowers." The envelopes can be placed in the collection basket or mailed in to the office. These contributions are often made in memory of someone so please include the name(s) with your contributions. I will keep these folks in my prayers in a special way and I encourage all of our parishioners to do the same.

-O ANTIPHONS - According to the Universal Norms, number 42, beginning on December 17 each year, the Advent Weekdays are intended to serve to prepare more directly for the celebration of the Lord's Nativity (Birth). At weekday Masses, we will begin using Advent Preface II on that day (we have been using Advent Preface I) and we will begin hearing the "O Antiphons"... ... O Wisdom, O Sacred Lord, O Flower of Jesse's Stem, O Key of David, O Radiant Dawn, O King of All Nations, O Emmanuel (O God is With Us). It is no coincidence that the hymn. O Come, O Come Emmanuel has seven verses as each verse picks up on one of the seven O Antiphons.

There is much that one can continue to learn about the O Antiphons. Some of the following I've shared before but it is always a good review. From the USCCB, "The Roman Church has been singing the "O" Antiphons since at least the eighth century... They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but present ones as well. Their repeated use of the imperative "Come!" embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah."

And from Catholic culture.org, "The 'O' Antiphons are ancient antiphons that all begin with the invocation 'O.' They call to mind the ancient longing and pleading of the people of

the Old Testament for a Savior to come, invoking different Christological titles on the seven days before Christmas Eve. In praying these we remember the original yearning for the First Coming of Christ at Bethlehem, and echo the same waiting and supplication for the Emmanuel to come at Parousia, His Second Coming. The 'O' Antiphons take us through chronological order from before Creation to the birth of Christ at Bethlehem.

The O Antiphon for each day are as follows, in Latin and English: December 17: O Sapientia (O Wisdom); December 18: O Adonai (O Lord and Ruler); December 19: O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse); December 20: O Clavis David (O Key of David); December 21: O Oriens (O Dayspring); December 22: O Rex Gentium (O King of Nations); December 23: O Emmanuel (O God with Us). What I find so very interesting is that by the time we reach December 23, the backwards acrostic of the Latin initials of the Christological titles (the first letter of each Latin title) spell ERO CRAS which means "Tomorrow I will come."

Again, there is so much to learn about the O Antiphons. One more quick thing I want to point out is the "O" itself. It may seem that this is nothing more than the start of an invocation. However, the "O" points to fullness. Again, from Catholicculture.org, "The circle is just a simple closed geometric shape, but in context with these 'O' Antiphons it is more than a shape or letter of the alphabet. The 'O' is all encompassing. The 'O' denotes fullness, completeness, wholeness, ripeness. The 'O' symbolizes eternity, no beginning or end. This simple letter plumbs the depths and speaks to the final fulfillment in the Second Coming of Christ at Parousia."

-SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION - Please keep in your prayers those who are preparing to receive the Sacraments of First Reconciliation, Confirmation, and First Holy Communion. We have a number of children from both parishes preparing for these Sacraments. Confirmation and First Holy Communion for our Third Graders is scheduled for Saturday, February 1 at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Springfield.

-END-OF-YEAR CONTRIBUTIONS – Often times, folks wish to make a year-end contribution to the parish. If you would like to make such a contribution, I ask you to make those as soon as possible so that we can get them recorded in this calendar year.

Additionally, folks are sometimes required to take a withdrawal from a retirement account each year. In many cases, if the withdrawal goes directly to a charitable organization, there are significant tax advantages. If this applies to you, I encourage you to speak to a tax professional soon and consider a contribution to the parishes or to St. Mary School.

-AN ADVENT REFELCTION: The following is an excerpt from Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger's (Pope Benedict XVI) writing "Seek That Which Comes First":

Stepping Out of the Night

What is Advent? Many answers can be given. We can grumble and say that it is nothing but a pretext for hectic activity and commercialism, prettified with sentimental clichés in which people stopped believing ages ago. In many cases this may be true, but it is not the whole picture.

We can also say that Advent is a time when a kindness that is otherwise almost entirely forgotten is mobilized; namely, the willingness to think of others and give them a token of kindness. Finally we can say that Advent is a time when old customs live again, for instance, in the singing of carols which takes place all over the country. In the melodies and the words of these carols, something of the simplicity, imagination and glad strength of the faith of our forefathers makes itself heard in our age, bringing consolation and encouraging us perhaps to have another go at that faith which could make people so glad in such hard times.

This latter kind of experience of Advent brings us quite close to what the Christian tradition has in mind with this season. It has expressed its view of Advent in the Bible texts which it took as the season's signposts. I will mention just one of them, a few verses from Paul's letter to the Christians in Rome. There he says, "... it is full time now for you to wake from sleep...the night is far gone, the day is at hand. Let us then cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light, let us conduct ourselves becomingly as in the day, not in revelling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ..." (Rom 13:11-14).

There are many people, of course, who urge us to get up and awake; "Germany, awake!" was the cry of those who, years ago, were bent on deluding the nation; and today

too there are awakenings and uprisings that lead further into darkness instead of out of it. What does Paul mean? He puts very clearly what he means by "night" by speaking of "revelling and drunkenness, debauchery, licentiousness, quarrelling and jealousy". For Paul, nocturnal revelling with all that goes with it stands for the dark side of human nature, man's being "asleep". For him it becomes a symbol of the pagan world as such, submerged in material things, held fast in the darkness that prevails where there is no truth and which, despite all its decibels and hectic activity, is asleep, because it lives unaware of genuine reality, of the real human vocation.

Nocturnal orgies as the image of a world in ruin—are we not appalled to see how aptly Paul characterizes our present times, which are returning to paganism? For us, "rising from sleep" means arising from conformity with the world and with the times and having the courage to believe and to shake off the dream that causes us to bypass our true vocation and our best possibilities. Perhaps the Advent hymns we hear every year may be lights to us, indicating our path, making us look up and recognize that there are greater promises than those of money, power and pleasure. Being awake for God and for other people—that is the kind of "waking" that Advent has in mind, the wakefulness which discovers the light and brightens the world."

Thank you for your continued prayers and support for me, one another, our parishes and school, and the Universal Church. Please be assured of my continued daily prayers for you. May you have a most blessed week and continued Advent Season!
