Second Sunday in Ordinary Time **JANUARY 19, 2025**

Isaiah 62:1-5; 1 Corinthians 12:4-11; John 2:1-11

We return to "Ordinary Time", the season of the life of the Church. Green is the color of life and of hope; our vestments and altar frontals will be green until Lent begins (March 6). Because of the Gospel selection, today is often called "Cana Sunday." The basic story is simple: Jesus and his followers go to a wedding feast; the host runs short of wine; Mary tells Jesus who seemingly rebuffs her. Mary tells the waiters to do whatever Jesus says. Jesus then changes the water into

But the rest of the story is much deeper. John's Gospel always has at least two levels, one obvious and one deeper and not so obvious. The purpose of John's Gospel is to show the replacement of all the forms of Judaism with something new and better.

Jesus works seven "signs" to do this. This first sign alludes to the Jewish manner of purification (the water jars). This is replaced by the lavish (about 125-150 gallons) new wine of Christ (representing the grace of love and salvation). Jesus calls his mother "woman", alluding to the "woman" in Genesis 3:15 whose son will stamp out evil. The old woman Eve and her heritage is replaced by the new woman, the Church, represented by Mary. The marriage of God to Israel is replaced by the marriage of the Church to Christ. The theme is newness, richness, joy, and love.

Do you think you are a nobody? Then you'll act like one! But if you think that you are a beloved son or daughter of God, you should act as one. The second reading tells us that God has given each of us distinct talents and gifts. And he calls on us to "give them away", to use them in service to others for the building up of the Church.

Insofar as we try to serve others and "give away" our gifts, the Lord will lavish on us even more abundantly. Let us pray to know our gifts and to use them in joy for others. If we seek to serve, we shall be amazed at

Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, January 19, 2025

Dear Parishioners,

Upon entering the Church, one will notice that the Christmas decorations have been taken down and packed away for next year. It is clearly evident that the Christmas season has come to an end. What the Church celebrates at this time is a return to what is called "ordinary time." This is the time of the year that has no distinctive character but instead celebrates the mystery of Christ in its fullness. This time will last until Ash Wednesday with the beginning of Lent. Our color for this time of the year is green, a symbol of hope and growth.

This weekend therefore celebrates the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time. For those wondering, there is no 1st Sunday in this time called "ordinary." Our gospel for this weekend is another type of "epiphany" experience as it shows the glory of Jesus in our midst through the changing of water into wine at the wedding feast of Cana. In this particular lesson, we find a neat exchange between mother and son, and reflects the powerful intercession that Mary has with her son. As Mary discovers that this young couple are about to run out of wine, a type of embarrassment for this newly married couple, Mary takes it upon herself and approaches Jesus. All she says to Jesus is "they have no wine." Jesus then replies, "Woman how does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come." Without skipping a beat, or arguing about why He should do something, all Mary does is say to the servant, "Do whatever He tells you." Again, Mary, the mother, knew without any doubt that her Son would do whatever she asked—and He did. Once again showing why the Church has always upheld Mary as a powerful intercessor for all humankind. No wonder we pray always, "Holy Mary, mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death." A strong devotion to Mary has always been promoted and encouraged for Jesus answers her prayers.

I also ask your prayers as we go to Springfield to appear before the Commission of Buildings and Property this Thursday, January 23. Along with our architects and engineers we present our plans for our new addition to our grade school as well as the transformation of our cafeteria into a parish center. Hopefully we will receive our final permissions in anticipation of breaking ground in the Spring. But one never knows so I ask your prayers that we have our "i's" dotted and our "t's" crossed as we present our final plans to the diocese.

Also for your information, next weekend, January 25-26, we will begin Catholic Schools Week here at St. Peter School. This particular weekend, our students will be involved in our liturgies, reflecting a very important week as we celebrate being a Catholic school. Furthermore, a celebration of this sort reminds us of a very important tool for evangelization, namely, our Catholic grade school. Through the example of our young people in attendance, many of our adults have had a change of heart and are either learning more about the Catholic faith or have returned to the Church. So our grade school is a school not only for the young but seem to encourage people of all ages to draw closer to Christ and His Church.

In light of Catholic Schools Week, I remind you of our pancake and sausage breakfast in our school gym next Sunday, January 26, beginning at 8:30 to 12:30 p.m. Chris Cakes will be cooking and serving and tossing pancakes.






