ST. THOMAS

St. Thomas Epiphany Party - Sunday, January 5 is our day to celebrate as a parish family all the joys of the Christmas season. Join us after Mass for a delicious dinner. You don't have to bring anything, except yourselves. There will be a cake walk (always fun!) for both adults and children. There are sign-up sheets at the back of church.

EPIPHANY

Today the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Epiphany. Following is some information regarding the Epiphany taken from ewtn.com:

-"What is the Solemnity of the Epiphany? On this feast, the Church celebrates the manifestation (epiphany) of Christ to the Nations (Gentiles) in the persons of the Magi - also known as the Wise Men or the Three Kings. In earlier times, this feast combined two other manifestations: one that took place at the Lord's Baptism and one that took place in Cana at the wedding feast. This is still the custom in Eastern Christianity. Although the date of the Epiphany on the General Calendar of the Church is January 6, in the United States and some other countries it is celebrated on the Sunday after January 1 so more Catholics can participate. Thus, in 2025 the Solemnity of the Epiphany is Sunday, January 5."

-"Who were the Magi or Wise Men? The word "magi" is of Persian origin and refers to a class of men who were priestsscientists-philosophers rolled into one. Different ancient societies used different names, but all had some intellectual class which sought knowledge and truth, even though much of what they possessed was corrupted by sin and error. Nonetheless, through the means to which they were accustomed, such as reading "signs" in nature, God drew them to true knowledge, in this case, the knowledge of Himself and Christ. According to tradition, their names were Balthasar (from Arabia), Melchior (from Persia), and Caspar (from India)."

-"What are the three gifts of the Three Kings? The Magi brought gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the Baby Jesus. St. John Chrysostom said, "For by gold the power of a king is signified, by frankincense the honor of God, by myrrh the burial of the body; and accordingly they offer Him gold as King, frankincense as God, myrrh as Man."

-"What is the spiritual meaning of Epiphany? On the Solemnity of the Epiphany in 2019, Pope Francis said, 'It is not enough to know where Jesus was born, as the scribes did, if we do not go there. It is not enough to know that Jesus was born, like Herod, if we do not encounter him. When his place becomes our place, when his time becomes our time, when his person becomes our life, then the prophecies come to fulfilment in us. Then Jesus is born within us. He becomes the living God for me. Today we are asked to imitate the Magi. They do not debate; they set out. They do not stop to look but enter the house of Jesus. They do not put themselves at the center but bow down before the One who is the center. They do not remain glued to their plans but are prepared to take other routes. Their actions reveal a close contact with the Lord, a radical openness to him, a total engagement with him. With him, they use the language of love, the same language that Jesus, though an infant, already speaks. Indeed, the Magi go to the Lord not to receive, but to give. Let us ask ourselves this question: at Christmas did we bring gifts to Jesus for his party, or did we only exchange gifts among ourselves?"

-"What gifts can we give to Jesus? Jesus wants us to grow closer to Him, so our gifts should reflect this goal. We can pray more, read Sacred Scripture, go to Confession, forgive someone, or break a sinful habit."
