Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord

JANUARY 5, 2025

Isaiah 60:1-6; Ephesians 3:2-3a,5-6; Matthew 2:1-12

"Epiphany" means "Manifestation" or "Showing Forth." Originally, it referred to the official visit of a king or emperor to his provinces. There were parades (during which courtiers threw coins to the onlookers.) There was a banquet for citizens, and a general amnesty.

The word "epiphany" was taken over by the Church for the "showing forth" of the Son of God in-the-flesh. Originally, the feast commemorated three events: the coming of the Magi, the baptism of Jesus, and the wedding feast of Cana. In each case, Jesus manifested his glory.

As time went on, the focus in many (perhaps most) countries was the Magi. These were pagan wise men who probably came from Arabia or Persia. The great irony is that the Chosen people (king and priests and sages at Jerusalem) were indifferent to the birth of Jesus, whereas these pagans traveled long and far!

In our times, the focus of Epiphany is the conversion of the world. Each of the Scripture readings tell of the longing of the Gentiles and nations for light. The first reading speaks of the non-Jewish nations who wish to walk by the light of the Lord.

The Responsorial Psalm proclaims that every nation on earth should adore the Lord. The second reading says that Gentiles (non-Jews) are called to be co-heirs with the Jews in salvation. The Gospel tells of the pagan Magi who come from afar to worship the Lord.

The challenge to us is to spread the message of the truth of Jesus Christ and his Church to the world. It must begin in our neighborhood. Who have you invited to faith last year? Who will you invite this year?

The Epiphany of the Lord Solemnity, January 5, 2025

Dear Parishioners,

"Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you. See, darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds cover the peoples; but upon you the Lord shines, and over you appears His glory. Raise your eves and look about; they all gather and come to you, your sons come from *afar.*" On this Solemnity of the Epiphany, the day seems to fulfill these words. This Solemnity celebrates the glorious appearance of the Lord to all humanity and to all of creation. As the glory of the Lord appeared to the Jewish people on Christmas, this day celebrates the glorious appearance to the non-Jewish world represented by the Magi. Between Christmas and Easter, Jesus has entered our world to reconcile Jews and Gentiles, and shows Himself as the Lord of all. The Magi, often called the wise men or three kings, were Gentiles or unbelievers. Something about their observation of the stars led them to the place where they found this newborn Savior. With an act of adoration, they placed before Him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Each of these gifts had a special meaning, gold for a king, frankincense for a God, and myrrh, indicating His death and burial. In many of the European countries, this particular Solemnity had greater significance than Christmas itself. And so in the spirit of this Solemnity, I wish each of you a very Merry Christmas.


