# Third Sunday of Lent MARCH 23, 2025

Exodus 3:1-8a,13-15; 1 Corinthians 10:1-6,10-12; Luke 13:1-9

[There are alternate Biblical texts that may be used for the first and second readings.]

"Get with the program!" might sum up the theme of today's Mass.

The first reading describes Moses' encounter with the Lord in the burning bush. The Lord calls on Moses to return to Egypt to lead the Israelites out of slavery. Moses is an escaped felon. He has a good thing going. He has married well, and would be perfectly content to live the rest of his days in the land of Midian.

Here, and elsewhere, Moses puts up every possible objection as to why he should not return to Egypt. God reveals his name as "I AM" or "he who is, who was, and who will never cease to be." This is the Hebrew word "Yahweh." (So sacred is the Name that even today Jews will never pronounce it! We might well imitate their reverence!)

In the second reading, Paul draws an analogy for the Corinthians. They had grown smug and self-satisfied. They had been baptized. They had received the Holy Spirit. They had the Eucharist. Paul tells them that all this is worthless unless they show forth the good fruit of virtue — especially charity. He says that the Israelites in the desert were "baptized" in Moses (when they passed through the Red Sea); they had spiritual food and drink (water from the rock and manna); the cloud of God's presence was with them.

But they were not pleasing to God! They were gripers, whiners, and rebels. It is an object lesson not only to the Corinthians but to us. (Jewish tradition said that the rock followed them throughout forty years' wandering, and that they always had fresh water. Paul goes a step further and says the rock was Christ!)

The Gospel is not one of the best in the lectionary, but its meaning is clear: Some people think that catastrophes happen because of sins. Jesus uses some examples known to his hearers and says that they weren't any worse sinners than other people.

All are called to bear good fruit. If a fruit tree doesn't bear fruit, you prune it and fertilize it. If it still doesn't bear fruit, you cut it down. This will be our lot unless we bear good fruit. Get with the program! Stop your whining and griping! Stop hesitating! Start bearing the good fruit of righteousness in the community


# Dear Parishioners,

We gather this Sunday to celebrate the 3rd Sunday in our season of Lent. You will notice that this weekend we are given two sets of readings for our Masses, one set for the cycle A readings and the other set for the cycle C readings. During our Masses, the Cycle A readings will be used at the 9:30 a.m. Mass as we will be celebrating what are called the Scrutinies for those involved in our OCIA process. Our elect (those to be baptized at the Easter Vigil) will be celebrating the First Scrutiny which centers around the Cycle A readings. In these readings what is the predominant thought is that of water. In our first reading from Exodus the people of Israel were complaining as they thirst for water. They grumbled and complained. This is when Moses is told to strike the rock and water will flow from it for the people to drink. And so it happened. When we think of water, we think of the life-giving water that comes to us at Baptism. And so this reading reminds us of that water in which we are baptized or will be baptized that provides life and satisfies all of our thirsts in life. What a beautiful symbol of baptism. Then in our gospel for this weekend, Jesus meets a Samaritan woman at the well. It is said that Jesus was thirsting for this woman's faith. And what happens is that she undergoes a conversion of heart because of this encounter and Jesus provides her with what is termed as "life-giving" water. This gospel is an open invitation to a conversion of heart, where we will discover that living water will spring up from our hearts and bathe us in salvation. These readings are in preparation for the scrutiny which will occur at the 9:30 Mass. A scrutiny used to be a series of tests, in preparation for Baptism. But our scrutiny today is a series of prayers as the community prays for the Elect, those preparing for the Easter sacraments.

For those attending the other Masses, our readings will be from Cycle C. In this first reading from Exodus, we find Moses being introduced to God. God's presence is experienced in the burning bush, a bush on fire but not being consumed. It is in that experience that we find Moses being called by God to go to the people of Israel and to work to set them free from their oppression by the Egyptians. We might never experience a burning bush in our personal lives, but the Lord, nevertheless, calls each of us to have a role in His plan of salvation. Then in our gospel, we find an element of hope in the gospel. Jesus tells the parable about the fig tree that doesn't produce fruit. For years, the fig tree was given chance after chance to produce the fruit. Just when it was to be cut down, the following was said, "Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future." God is patient and never gives up on us. But we have to have some accountability for producing the fruit that God wants from us. Let's pray that all of us will experience God's call in our lives and that we will produce the fruits that reflect the stewardship in our lives.

If you have not contributed to the Catholic Charities collection for Quincy, I ask you to do so this weekend. Just place the donation in an envelope, mark it Catholic Charities, and place it in the collection. Again this is a way to share your almsgiving for Lent with the local community through Catholic Charities. Thank you for your generosity.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Soon our diocese will take up The Catholic Relief Services Collection. Your support for this collection provides emergency assistance to victims of war and natural disasters; assists migrants and refugees who need housing, education, and specialized legal assistance; and supports travelers and others whose livelihoods require special pastoral support to access the sacraments. Among the most vulnerable of migrants are the victims of human trafficking.

The invaluable work to assist these victims of abuse and injustice is supported by funds received through The Catholic Relief Services Collection. 


