Easter Sunday

APRIL 20, 2025

Acts 10:34a,37-43; Colossians 3:1-4 (or 1 Corinthians 5:6b-8); John 20:1-9 (or Luke 24:1-12)

In all Masses of Easter, we renew our baptismal promises. Most of us were too young to remember our baptism; our sponsors and parents made the promises for us. But we must "ratify" those vows if we are to be Christians. We promised to renounce Satan and all his attractions; we promised to be loyal to Jesus Christ.

What does it mean to you to be a Catholic Christian? Do you just "go through the motions," or does Jesus Christ make a difference in your life at every moment? If Jesus Christ did not rise from the dead, then the Church is a fraud and faith is a sham. But if he really did rise from the dead, his message is true! And if it is true, then you must follow him with all your heart and soul and strength and mind.

On Palm Sunday, the New Testament reading (Philippians 2:6) told us that our attitude must always be that of Christ. Don't be a hypocrite; don't be two-faced: If you say you are Catholic, then be one. If you don't want to practice it, don't pretend!

To be Catholic means some tough decisions in this world. It means absolute honesty. It means carrying our crosses joyfully, whatever they be. It means having hope even when things seem hopeless. It means doing the best we can, and putting our complete trust in the Lord.

To follow Christ means purity of heart and body. It means that we use our sexuality only in the context of marriage. It means the moderation of all our appetites and desires, using them only as God intends them. It means standing up for what is true and right, even when we are opposed and laughed at.

If some of these things seem hard, realize that it is liberating to follow Christ! He frees us from entanglements which drag us to destruction. He gives us absolute joy and eternal happiness, for he has conquered death by his resurrection!

The first reading is a sermon of Peter to Cornelius. He tells the story of Jesus, concluding with the death and resurrection of the Lord. The second reading (Colossians) tells us that we should be concerned about the things of heaven, since (in our baptism) we have been raised with Christ. The alternative second reading tells us that we should live a "Passover" being a pure dough in Christ who was sacrificed for us.

The Gospel translation may not convey the full impact of the words "wrappings on the ground." In the original language, the words mean "wrappings laying in their folds." The idea is that the wrappings still had the contour of the body of Jesus even though the body was not there. It was as if the body had evaporated! The only explanation can be that he had risen from the dead. (Otherwise, the wrappings would show wrinkles, or would show that someone had snatched the body away.) Christ has risen! Let us be loyal to him.

Dear Parishioners,

"On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, 'They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put Him.' So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in. When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered His head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed."

This is our gospel for Easter Sunday. Needless to say, the emphasis in this gospel is not about a race between John and Simon Peter to see who could arrive at the tomb first. What it is about are a number of statements that should touch our lives this day. First, the tomb was empty. This was something unexpected and a mystery to all involved. Second, the young disciple understood his place and did not enter the tomb until Peter arrived. Three, the burial cloths were all in their rightful place yet the body of Jesus was not present. And fourth, and the most astonishing, it says that the young disciple went into the tomb and it stated, "He saw and believed." That fourth and last statement of the gospel is most important, for it became the foundation of the Christian faith and Christian hope. "He saw and He believed." Even though we do not see, yet our faith tells us through this witness of Peter and John, that there is cause for our belief in the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. And if we believe in that resurrection then Paul's letter to the Colossians should be our guiding principle for our lives: "if then you were raised with Christ, seek what is above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. Think of what is above, not of what is on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God."

What I have to say now, I know and recognize that I am a bit biased. But I think that our liturgies of Holy Week, especially the celebration of the Triduum is probably the most beautiful and dignified liturgies that we celebrate. For this to be possible, it takes so many people to prepare, coordinate, and decorate for these liturgies. So I want to thank our cantors, servers, choir, musicians, ushers, as well as our deacons and priests for making our liturgies come alive and be reflective of the day; I also thank our people who set the mood of the day with the decorations that they created, what a beautiful tribute to the solemnity of the feast. It takes a parish to celebrate good liturgies and I consider our celebrations really great liturgies. Thank you to all who make this possible. I appreciate your touch.

I think I confused people because I announced that my procedure would be a week early. It is this Tuesday, April 22. Please remember me in your prayers as I will offer all my discomfort for all of you.
