Solemnity of The Ascension

JUNE 1, 2025

Acts 1:1-11; Ephesians 1:17-23;

or Hebrews 9:24-28; 10:19-23;

Luke 24:46-53

Heaven is not “up;” hell is not “down;” earth is not in the middle. Often, however, we visualize a “three-storeyed” universe. In many ways this is a problem: If we imagine Jesus going “up,” we may think of him as far from us, as billions of light years away. It’s hard to imagine him as close to us with such an idea.

The ascension of Jesus is not his being “taken away” from us. Rather, the ascension means that he enters the dimension of the Father’s glory. His sacrifice is accepted by the Father, who takes him to “his right hand.” At the “right hand” of the Father, Jesus is our Mediator, our Intercessor with the Father. We can have perfect confidence in the love of the Father, for Jesus is “at his right hand.”

At the same time, Jesus has not departed from us. He has entered the Father’s glory in order to be closer to us than he was in his visible, physical body. He is right here with us. We can, therefore, have confidence in our prayers which are heard by the Father “through Jesus Christ our Lord.” We can have confidence that Jesus, who is with us, knows us, cares for us, loves us, and will see us through every crisis.

Our first reading describes the ascension. Jesus is taken into the cloud of the Father’s glory. It is the same cloud we saw in the Exodus, in the dedication of the temple at Jerusalem, and in the Transfiguration. While the apostles gaze at the scene, angels tell them and us to get busy. We must not rest until we proclaim the “Good News” to every creature.

Our second reading, from Hebrews, compares the ascension of Jesus to the entrance of the high priest into the Holy of Holies on the Day of Atonement. On that day, all sins were thought to be forgiven as the high priest sprinkled the Ark of the Covenant with blood.

But the blood of Jesus infinitely satisfies for all sins of all times. Jesus enters the glory of the Father, and his sacrifice assures us that the Father loves us and forgives us.

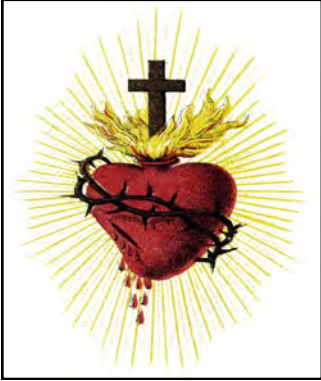
In Luke’s description of the ascension, Jesus promises that the Holy Spirit will come upon the apostles. They are empowered to teach truth in his name, and to sanctify all peoples.

The power of the Holy Spirit resides in the Church. We share in that mission; we are empowered and commanded to proclaim the message of Jesus Christ to all peoples.

THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD



JUNE: THE MONTH OF THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS

The month of June is dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The Sacred Heart expresses the immense love and compassion God has for us. The devotion to the Sacred Heart invites us all to venerate, meditate upon and imitate the immense love and compassion of God symbolized by the Sacred Heart. This devotion spread in the Church as a result of the series of visions received by St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, a French nun who belonged to the Order of the Visitation of Holy Mary (*Visitandines*) in eastern France in the 1670's.

In the visions, which continued for 18 months, Jesus revealed to St. Margaret ways to venerate His Sacred Heart and explained the immense love He has for humanity. On June 16, 1675, Jesus told her to promote a feast in honour of His Sacred Heart. He also gave her 12 promises made to all who venerate and promote the devotion.

Today, the feast of the Sacred Heart is celebrated in the universal Church as a solemnity on the Friday following the feast of the *Corpus Christi*. The feast was officially established by Pope Pius IX in 1856. This feast usually falls in the month of June. The entire month of June has traditionally since become a time for a more extensive and focused devotion to the Sacred Heart. This allows the faithful to immerse themselves in the contemplation of this profound mystery.

The 12 promises of the Sacred Heart of Jesus made to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque for all who venerate and promote the devotion are as follows:

1. I will give them all the graces necessary for their state of life.
2. I will give peace in their families.
3. I will console them in all their troubles.
4. I will be their refuge in life and especially in death.
5. I will abundantly bless all their undertakings.
6. Sinners shall find in my heart the source and infinite ocean of mercy.
7. Tepid souls shall become fervent.
8. Fervent souls shall rise speedily to great perfection.
9. I will bless those places wherein the image of my Sacred Heart shall be exposed and venerated.
10. I will give to priests the power to touch the most hardened hearts.
11. Persons who propagate this devotion shall have their names eternally written in my heart.

In the excess of the mercy of my heart, I promise you that my all-powerful love will grant to all those who will receive Communion on the first Fridays, for nine consecutive months, the grace of final repentance: They will not die in my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; and my heart will be their secure refuge in that last hour.

Join us every Friday of June for devotions to the Sacred Heart immediately after the 6:30 a.m. Mass. God bless.

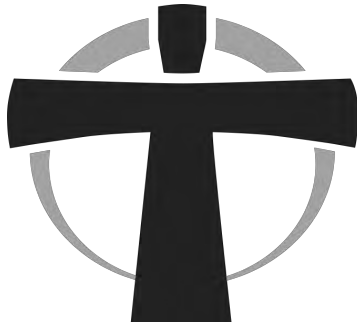
