## Pentecost Sunday

**JUNE 8, 2025** 

Acts 2:1-11; 1 Corinthians 12:3b-7,12-13; John 20:19-23 or John 14:15-16.23b-26

On Sunday, after the second reading, the Sequence "Veni Sancte Spiritus" (Come Thou Holy Spirit, Come) is sung. Only two Sequences remain in our Roman liturgy, one at Easter and one at Pentecost. At the end of Mass, the Paschal Candle is extinguished, a sign that the Easter season is over.

Our first reading describes the coming of the Holy Spirit in power. The rushing wind, the quaking, and the fire are intended to recall the theophany of Mt. Sinai, when Moses received the Torah. The inaugural of the new covenant recalls the theophany of the covenant made with Moses. The theoph-any is also a "substitute parousia."

Jews expected the glorious coming in power of the Messiah; they believed that all wrongs would be righted, that all suffering would cease, that the dead would rise, and that there would be perfect peace and justice forever when the Messiah came.

There would also be the outpouring of God's Spirit. It didn't happen exactly that way. The Spirit comes, and the community of the Church is empowered by the Spirit. But the full perfection of the kingdom must wait for a while.

"Pentecost" means "fiftieth." It was a Jewish festival which celebrated the full harvest of wheat and the inaugural of the covenant of Mt. Sinai. In our Christian Pentecost, the harvest is not of wheat, but of people – all the people of the earth are called to salvation. Even in the Jewish festival, there were overtones of the inclusion of Gentiles in salvation! This has now been fulfilled.

In the second reading, Paul describes the variety of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. All gifts are to be used for the building up of the Church in unity of faith and love.

The Gospel describes Jesus' conferral of the Holy Spirit on Easter: The Spirit enables the Church to do what Christ himself had done: to forgive sins, to teach truth, and to sanctify all people.

### PENTECOST SUNDAY

We come to this final weekend of the Easter Season, Pentecost. Fifty days after Easter Sunday we end the Easter Season. The outpouring of the Holy Spirit, the birth of the Church given a new life, courage, and protection by that Spirit. We hear in the Acts of the Apostles about the moment of Pentecost. It says they were gathered in one place. Some imagine this taking place in the upper room. The scriptures don't tell us directly where, yet they do. It says all in one place, and the Spirit filled the house. What house? Then after the outpouring of the Holy Spirit it states: "as the Spirit enabled them to proclaim. Now there devout Jews from every nation under heaven...they gathered in a large crowd." Most scripture scholars would say this took place in the temple itself. First, where else would there be a multitude of Jews gathering in one place for them to preach to? More importantly, the prophet Ezekiel prophesied that the Shekinah, the glory of the divine presence, would return to the temple one day. In Pentecost this takes place, as the temple is God's house filled once again with the Holy Spirit, as well as the Apostles, the new temple, the Church is filled with the Holy Spirit. What a beautiful moment. We are promised the Advocate in the Gospel today and taught real love. We hear a lot of what people think real love for the Lord is all about. Our culture tells us it's permissiveness. Jesus tells us it's obedience to Him. So may we be inspired by the Spirit to do our best, with His help, to live out the commands of Jesus Christ; not what I want, or you want, but what He wants from us. May we be animated, given courage, and protected by this great Spirit to live out and follow the Word that is Jesus Christ.

Please make sure you volunteer to make our picnic great this year! It is coming up and I know there are many opportunities to make this event a wonderful experience and profitable fundraiser for our school.

#### With the end of the Easter Season, we will return to the friars' choir/chapel for daily Mass.

Lastly keep my uncle, Msgr. Leo Enlow in your prayers as he celebrates 50 years a priest! What a gift to have an uncle with such experience as a brother priest. My WHOLE family will be around this weekend in Quincy to celebrate with him.




