

A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:

We encounter the story of the Good Samaritan this weekend, a story well-known to even those who are only casually familiar with Christian Scriptures. We know the contours of the story, hearing how a man suffers from an attack, and receives help, not from a priest or a scribe, but from a detested foreigner, a Samaritan. Scripture alludes to how Jews and Samaritans had been enemies for centuries due to mutual excommunications over heritage and respective faith practices. Everyone who hears this story can discern the moral imperative to provide aid and comfort to those in need. Indeed, many can discern the importance of overcoming differences of race, class, nationality, religious belief, and sex when human decency and charity for those in desperate need is on the line.



The context of the entire story comes from a lawyer however, who wanted to trap Jesus and 'justify himself' (Lk 10:19) for some kind of position which, it would appear, would be more 'nuanced', more 'logical', more 'palatable' than an undiscerning and unconditional "love of God, and of neighbor" as the pathway to eternal life preached by Jesus (Lk 10: 25-26). What would be more nuanced, logical, and palatable to *unconditional love*? For the lawyer, it would be some kind of *limited love... for a just and reasonable cause*.

Jesus tells the story, and we come to the punchline... the shocking conclusion is not that someone reaches out to help a victim who is mortally wounded, but that that person who reaches out would be a Samaritan. The hero is the enemy! In this story, the compassion of the villain, not limited by time or circumstance, not constrained by logic or social convention, reveals the lawyer's shame and the power of Jesus' simple, unconditional words, "love God, love your neighbor".

We are drawn to this story because at the same time it calls for compassion, it also strikes at the heart of our own sense of vulnerability to inspire hope when all is hopeless. With virtuous compassion that we want to recognize in ourselves, we want to see that man in the story receive help! He had two good chances in the priest and the scribe, but that opportunity was missed! And then the Samaritan comes along and saves the day. The story has a happy ending as we see that compassion is served with a tidy little sense of justice, even.

And then we look at the story and consider 'what if that were me', desperate for help, losing hope, dying in the ditch? Even in the midst of such despair, we recognize that God's help and aid, his love can come from the most unexpected places... even from the Samaritan. The one who doesn't look or sound like me, the one who perhaps isn't Catholic or even Christian. Indeed, that person could be one, whom in other circumstances we might brand as a racist... a criminal... insane... threatening... immoral... undeserving... different, in one of so many possible ways. Not only can God's help come from these unexpected encounters, but then does that not also obligate me to be ready to return the favor to those we encounter who might be different as well?

The Good Samaritan story reminds us that our love for neighbor must have no bounds, as the love of God for us, similarly, has no bounds. Can we legitimately limit our love for neighbor when we can 'justify' in our minds that the risk is too high, the circumstance too inconvenient, the recipient too undeserving, the situation too unsafe, or the optics too socially unacceptable? What does Jesus say? He keeps it simple... "love God, love neighbor". That's all.

REMINDER: There will be no scheduled confessions or Saturday evening Mass at 6:30 p.m. at St. Anthony next week due to the picnic taking place on grounds. For picnic weekend only, we will have an extra Sunday Evening Mass at 4:00 p.m., intended for our workers and any others who would like to attend at that hour.


