Genesis 18:20-32;
Colossians 2:12-14;
Luke 11:1-13

A general theme for today's Mass might be: "Persevere in prayer." Quite often, the theme of the Mass is summed up in the Responsorial Psalm. Today, the refrain for the psalm is: "Lord, on the day I called for help, you answered me."

The first reading is a very primitive account of "Semitic bargaining" between Abraham and God. The cities of Sodom and Gomorrah were proverbial for their corruption. Evil demands the judgment of God. But Abraham keeps reminding God how good he is. Surely God wouldn't want anyone to say that he destroyed the innocent with the guilty!

Abraham keeps bargaining and pleading. Unfortunately, there were not even ten good people in Sodom. In the Gospel, Jesus gives the Lord's Prayer as the model of all prayer. We pray that God may be recognized by all people, that his will be done, that he will give us our needs, that he will forgive us as we forgive others, and that he will protect us from the final cataclysm.

Jesus says that if we, as bad as we are, know how to give good things to our children, how much more will God give us his blessings, if we have faith. We must always keep asking; we must keep knocking on the Lord's door.

The second reading gives us confidence in our prayer: We don't ask God to hear us because of our merits. Rather, we ask him to hear us because of Christ, and because we belong to Christ.

17TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Friday Eucharistic Adoration

The readings of this seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time brings to our consideration the importance of perseverance in prayer. God is not in a hurry; He is ever ready to listen to our prayers no matter how irritating we may consider it in human terms. From the book of Genesis, Abraham took advantage of this empathic listening nature of God to intercede for the righteous people living in Sodom and Gomorrah, cities marked for destruction. In Luke's gospel, the same perseverance in prayer is highlighted with the parable of a friend in need. His needs were granted not simply because he went to his friend but because he persevered in asking.

The Church is replete with devotional practices that help us to persevere in prayer. A very good example is the devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. This devotion which places us in proximity to the heart of Christ is very simple and can be practiced by anybody. It helps us to experience His love and share it with whoever we come in contact with. The devotional practices to the Sacred Heart of Jesus include the First Friday devotion, Holy Hour or Eucharistic Adoration, celebrating the Feast of the Sacred Heart, devotional prayers to the Sacred Heart especially in the month of June, Consecration and enthronement, and praying for the Pope's intention.

Many Catholics are more concerned with the First Friday devotion. It centers on honoring the Sacred Heart of Jesus on the first Friday of nine consecutive months through some specific practices: attending Holy Mass, and receiving Holy Communion in the state of grace with the intention of making reparation for sins and ingratitude, especially to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Confession is necessary if one is not in the state of grace. Devotional prayers to the Sacred Heart are also necessary for reparation. A holy hour, often called Eucharistic Adoration, is often observed. It is a period of prayer and meditation before the Blessed Sacrament.

The practice of First Friday devotion has a promise. The twelfth of the twelve promises of the Sacred Heart to those who practice the devotion states: "In the excess of the mercy of my heart, I promise you that my all powerful love will grant to all those who will receive Communion on the First Fridays, for nine consecutive months, the grace of final repentance: they will not die in my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; and my Heart will be their secure refuge in that last hour."

Here in the parish, we observe the First Friday devotion with Mass and Eucharistic Adoration. We celebrate the Holy Mass at 6:30 a.m. every Friday. The Eucharistic Adoration is in the evening from 5:30 to 6:30. This is to enable those who go to work in the morning and families who need to prepare their children for school to be able to participate. Unlike the Eucharistic Exposition on Wednesdays targeted solely for private prayer, the First Friday Eucharistic Adoration is communitarian. It features the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, some moment of silent prayers and adoration, hymn, reflection, praying the pope's intention for the month, First Friday devotional prayers, and benediction.

This coming month of August, the First Friday devotion, nay the first Friday of the month is on the first of August. You are all invited. The Eucharistic Adoration begins at 5.30 p.m. here in the church. We shall stay in the friars' chapel where we celebrate daily Masses. See you there.

Our Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) Program is for:

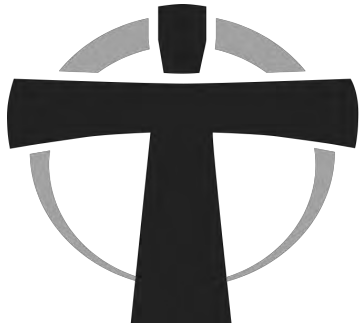
