2 Kings 5:14-17; 2 Timothy 2:8-13;
Luke 17:11-19

Today we meditate on “arrogance and gratitude.” Our first reading is the “rest of the story” of Naaman the Syrian leper. In the beginning of the story, Naaman, an important Syrian general, was a leper. His wife’s Israelite slave-girl told him that it was too bad he didn’t live in Israel, for he could be cured.

Naaman went to the king of Israel loaded with rich gifts and with a letter from his king. The letter said, “Here is my servant Naaman; cure him.” The king of Israel was beside himself. He thought that the king of Syria (or Aram) was just trying to pick a fight.

At this point, Elisha sent word to the king of Israel to send Naaman to him. When Naaman came, Elisha didn’t even go outside his house. He sent word for pompous Naaman to go and wash seven times in the muddy Jordan River. Naaman was indignant at first. But finally he humbled himself and did as he was instructed.

This is where today’s story begins. Naaman is a changed man. Not only was his leprosy cured; he also received spiritual healing. Now he is a humble, grateful man who praises only the God of Israel.

Our Gospel reading tells of Jesus’ cure of ten lepers. Not one of them came back to thank Jesus except a Samaritan. Jews hated Samaritans as half-breeds and heretics. But this Samaritan humbles himself to return to the hated Jews and give thanks.

Sometimes we can be very smug in our religion. We think that God owes us everything. We often take God and our faith for granted. God wants us to realize that he is the source of every good and perfect gift. We must humble ourselves before him and show our thanks for all that he does for us.

The Christian spiritual life is a life of stewardship: We recognize God as the giver of all blessings, and we try to thank him by our life of service.

28TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

This weekend's readings focus on the healing of leprosy, the healing of an outsider, and the grateful response that the outsider gives.

The Second Book of Kings tells the story of Elisha and Naaman. Side note, no I did not spell the prophet Elijah's name wrong. There is Elijah and, his successor, Elisha. Pronounced very similarly, but two different people. Naaman was the commander of a gentile army, the king of Aram. Naaman was also a leper, and outsider. The Arameans had conquered Israel. A little Israelite girl was in the service of Naaman's wife and told her mistress, "If only my master would present himself to the prophet in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy."

Naaman went to Samaria to Elisha to ask him to heal him but expected a spectacle. Elisha asked him to wash in the Jordan, plunging into the water seven times. Naaman is insulted that this is all he is asked to do and first rejects it as being no different than the water at home. He is convinced to just try it and see. Naaman is healed so thoroughly that his skin is like that of a little child. Naaman returns to Elisha to thank him, to praise the one true God, and to offer a gift in response to Elisha. After Elisha rejects the gifts, Naaman promises to offer sacrifices only to the Lord from this day forward.

The Gospel tells the story of the 10 lepers that cry out to God. The number 10 usually refers to a sense of divine completeness, perfect order, and God's law/governance. There are 10 lepers who cry out to Jesus to "have pity on us!" Jesus answers to show themselves to the priests. Only the priests could declare them clean again and allow them back into the community and right worship of God. They are cleansed on the way, but only the Samaritan returns to Jesus to thank Him.

Notice that Naaman goes to Samaria to meet Elisha the prophet. Here the Samaritan, the outsider, is the only one to return to the eternal priest, Jesus Christ, not only to thank Him, but for his declaration of being made clean. This man in gratitude came back to the Lord Jesus to thank Him for this healing. The number 10 was meant to be showing completeness, perfect order, and God's law/governance, but the other nine didn't return. Jesus declares not only is this man made clean, but that his faith has saved him.

How do we respond to the immensity of what Jesus is doing in our life? We too are outsiders. We are gentiles. Do we praise God in the good and the bad alike? Do we return to the Lord after our prayers are answered? After He has healed us and saved us? As we come to the end of this season of stewardship, are we taking the time to prayerfully re-commit ourselves to the Lord in our stewardship commitment cards? Are we turning them in? Are we filling them out online? Are we responding to the goodness of God in our lives in prayer, time, talent, and treasure?

Please respond to the Lord for what He has done for you!

All-day Wednesday Adoration On Hold for Now

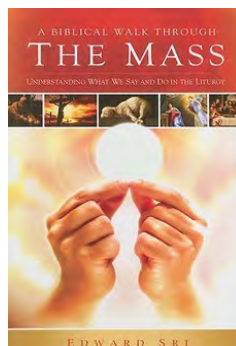

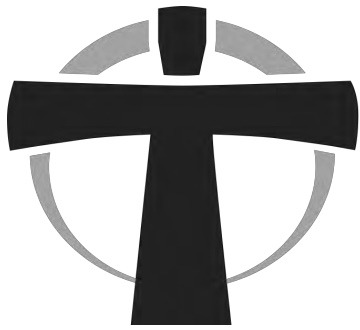
Eucharist Mission at St. Peter Parish
