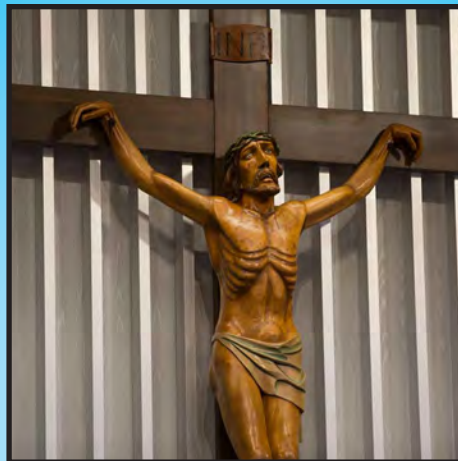

A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:



St. Thomas Aquinas writes that gratitude is a virtue annexed to justice. When someone does a good deed for us, it places us in obligation to our benefactor. That obligation would, at least, be the return of that favor. If someone buys us dinner, it would be fitting to return that favor at a future opportunity. If someone remembers our birthday, it is appropriate to make a similar remembrance in return.

But we are not always able to return our thankfulness in kind. If someone repairs my car, the last thing anyone

wants me to do is to turn around and wrench on their car in return. (Perhaps that is the reason my car was broken down in the first place—my inability to maintain it?) And so, how does that obligation get repaid? One way is through the economy. If a mechanic repairs my car, I may turn around and offer the bounty from my farm—maybe a cream of chicken soup with fresh vegetables. This, of course, presumes that the mechanic has a need for such a reimbursement, for bartering tends to easily mismatch the value of goods offered vs. good received. For most exchanges... when I take the car to the mechanic to be repaired... I reimburse that person with monetary payment, settling that obligation abstractly with tokens of value that can be exchanged for what the mechanic actually needs, not simply what I have to give.

For most of the good deeds we do, we neither expect nor require monetary payment or barter... we simply offer a word of "thanks". Saying thanks is an essential element of good etiquette we teach even our youngest of children. It is a sign of class to send a thank you note after a job interview or in receipt of a wedding gift. We acknowledge that some gifts are not meant to be formally returned, but to express respect and esteem and build relationships. For those moments we allow a word of 'thanks' to suffice the social and moral obligations of a good deed.

But mostly, we tend to live one step away from actual relationships of gratitude. In a typical case, we allow the value of money to carry our sentiment of our thanks. Going back to the example of the auto mechanic, I value the service at some hundreds of dollars that reimburses the mechanic for the price of the parts that were used and time for the service to be completed. My payment then provides sufficient motivation to be profitable to the mechanic to pay a mortgage, buy food, go on vacations, and tend to the other needs of life.

I suppose there are authentic examples where our payments can rise to the level of thanksgiving—a tip to a hard-working waiter, for instance. But the problem is that the exchange of money for goods and services inherently invites exploitative behavior where the virtue of thanks gets lost. "I value you to the extent that you can provide me goods and services." Indeed, my thanksgiving is limited to the smallest expression of gratitude (price) that I can get away with: I purchase my smart phone from one company charging the smallest price as a function of employing oppressed workers in a foreign land. This is preferential to paying a greater price for another product manufactured domestically.

Jesus himself acknowledged the threat of exploitation when we do good for others, teaching that our love for neighbor must be so pure as not to expect anything in return. Thus, when you throw a party, invite the poor, the lame, the blind... those unable to repay. In this you will be blessed in that the ultimate thanks will be repaid not by them, but by our Heavenly Father at the resurrection of the righteous (cf. Luke 14: 14). Thus, generosity in these cases is linked to an exercise of one's faith. The one giving the reward of thanksgiving, the one allowing himself to be 'exploited' in this scenario is the good God who can only give, and to whom our gifts of thanksgiving can add nothing to his greatness. God will settle the obligations of thanks on behalf of the poor and those in need with his own divine justice.

The study of gratitude in this week's Gospel is meant to jar us, I think. What happens when the circle of gratitude is not closed? It becomes an act not simply of ingratitude, but of injustice. What happens when we encounter injustice? As I have preached before, it becomes a motivation for anger. Do we feel a justified anger that the ten were healed but only one returned, acknowledging the good done for him by Jesus? It is not our anger, but we are angry for the ingratitude shown Jesus. We are lead to infer that the others who were healed might have been too selfish or self-absorbed to respond? That they were ungrateful? That they lacked social class? That they were distracted or busy? Ultimately we come back to the sense that this is a parable, again, about the dangers of indifference... a kind of spiritual sloth that not only betrays a deficiency in social class, but also displays irreverence towards the all-good God who creates, heals, and sacrifices himself for our good.

The preface dialogue before the Eucharistic Prayer, one of the most conserved prayers from the earliest centuries of Christian worship, calls on the people to "give thanks to the Lord, our God" for it is "right and just" to do so. To strengthen the spirit of gratitude and the virtues of divine justice among God's people, we are invited to make sacrifice to him by way of 'Eucharist'. This is the essence of 'religion' and of 'reverence' as well. God has no need of our praise, but our thanksgiving to him lifts us up into the economy of divine love for love's sake—made visible by the cross as a gift to those who could not otherwise help themselves. Worship helps us to break the closed circle of self-regard, to extend ourselves in thanksgiving to the all-good God to whom we can never repay for his love, except to be fully alive in him.

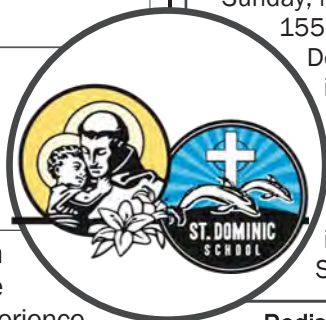
