Habakkuk 1:2-3,2:2-4; 2 Timothy 1:6-8,13-14;
Luke 17:5-10

The key word today – found in all three Scripture readings – is *faith*. The first reading is a complaint against God for not intervening when we are in trouble. When things go wrong, we cry out to God, “Where are you? Why didn’t you do something when we were in trouble?” God’s answer is that we must wait with hope for his justice. The rash person lashes out and gives up. The righteous person lives by *faith*.

The second reading uses *faith* in a slightly different sense. By the time this epistle was written, there was a body of belief or doctrine. The author of 2 Timothy urges us to guard the “rich deposit of *faith*.” He means that we must always be loyal to the truths which the Lord has revealed. If we stick to those beliefs, we shall be saved.

In the Gospel, the apostles ask the Lord to increase their *faith*. He tells them that they could do almost anything if they had a little bit of faith. He then gets at the root of their problem: They always want everything to go their own way. This is the wrong attitude. They should want things to go the Lord’s way. They should serve him loyally and ask for nothing more.

They should not be servants who do their job and expect their master to wait on them. When they have lived with absolute loyalty and faith, they must still say, “We are merely servants; we have done no more than our duty.” Of course, if we live this way – in a spirit of real faith and loyalty to the Lord – he will richly reward us.

But we must not get the cart before the horse: We serve him because he is right. We do not serve him from a motive of reward, but simply because we want his will to be done. With this attitude, he will reward us for genuine faith.

27TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

We read from the prophet Habakkuk this weekend. He is someone we may not be so familiar with. He is one of the 12 minor prophets. He was in the time just before the Babylonian exile. Habakkuk is known for voicing the frustration over injustice and evil in a world that mocks God. The book is only three chapters long. Very short. Chapter One is focused on the rampant violence and corruption in Judah. We can relate to Habakkuk often, as he asks the question why the wicked prosper, while the righteous suffer.

God's response to this is that he will raise up the Babylonian Empire as an instrument of judgement against his own people. Chapter Two tells Habakkuk to wait for a vision from the Lord, and the woes against Babylon that they will crumble. Chapter Three is a song of praise to God. This book and the passage this weekend helps us to wrestle with the timeless question of suffering, and trust in the Lord.

In the Gospel the Apostles ask Jesus to increase their faith. Any time you see faith in the scriptures you can replace it with trust and see the same meaning. The famous little mustard seed is a powerful example of what can happen when we trust God and have faith in His care. We then are not only called to trust and have faith, but that in this action we are called to be servants. Servants of God and one another. So, may we have this in our hearts to trust God and respond in service and love.

This weekend we continue the work of our stewardship renewal. Please listen carefully to the witness testimonies of how God is working in their lives and how they respond to this call of stewardship and service. Please continue praying how God is calling you out of your comfort zone and to serve and give and pour yourself out to the Lord and one another.

Thank you all for the prayers for my dad. Please continue to pray for him and my whole family as we have a lot of major illness taking place. I am so grateful for your support and prayers for all of us.

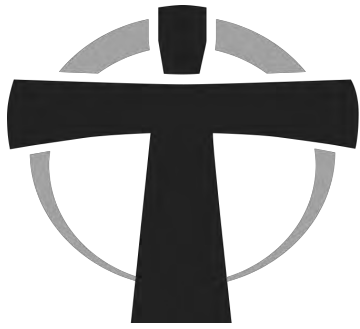
