Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King

NOVEMBER 23, 2025

2 Samuel 5:1-3; Colossians 1:12-20;
Luke 23:35-43

Who is Jesus? What does he mean in your life? We call him *Messiah* or *Christ*; do these words mean anything to you personally? We call him *Savior*, *Redeemer*, and *Lord*. What effect does this have in your life? In the Scriptures, he is called *Son of David*, *Son of God*, and *Son of Man*. Are these just words, or do they have a meaning for you?

The Church gropes for ways to express the mystery of Jesus, the Christ. Each *title* for Jesus should have some meaning for our lives. Today we use the title *king*. This title may have little relevance in our democratic world. But by this title, we seek to recognize that Jesus is the heart and center of our lives; we live for him; we find the meaning of all things in him; we accept his rule over our lives, and we live by his code of morality. It means that we strive to follow his will and to serve him in everything we think, say, and do.

Our first reading describes the anointing of David as King of Israel (c. 1000 B.C.) The words *Messiah* and *Christ* mean *Anointed One*. As David was anointed king, so Jesus is anointed to be King over all peoples. The Gospel does not show the glory of kingship. Jesus is dying on the cross. He does not choose to save himself, but to save another person, a thief! He forgives his sin and promises paradise to him. Our King Jesus shows his power most perfectly in his mercy. He died for you; will you live for him?

The second reading is one of the most profound passages in the entire Bible. The background is this: Mainstream Judaism at the time of Jesus believed that the Torah was the ultimate, eternal, unchanging, self-revelation of God. From all eternity, God spoke his saving word. When God created the universe, he used the Torah as the model. The whole purpose of creation was to fit in with the Torah.

The Torah was delivered to Moses in time, (c.1290 B.C.). But it was eternal and unchangeable. The view of Paul in the reading today is that Jesus, not the Torah, is the ultimate self-revelation of God. Jesus has replaced and superseded the Torah. Jesus is the image of the invisible God (i.e. the perfect expression of God). Everything was created through and for him (and not for or through the Torah). Everything that makes God to be God (*fullness*) is embodied in Jesus.

In the view of Paul, God the Word, the Second Person of the Trinity, would have become man, even if mankind had never sinned! The reason: Because Jesus (not the Torah) was the model and purpose of all creation, you can't have any creation without the model: the incarnate Son of God! We were created to reflect the incarnate Jesus Christ. We show that he is king over our lives by living as perfectly as possible the life of Christ.

THE FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING



On this feast of Christ the King, we have very theologically rich readings. First we hear the story about David becoming King. We are reminded of the fact that Jesus is the fulfillment to David of an eternal kingdom and eternal kingship. Then in the gospel, we see the kingship fulfilled in Jesus, taking the throne on the cross. This is not the kind of throne that we're used to for a king. This is where our king conquers death, and reigns eternally. On the cross, he is mocked by many, including one of the others being crucified with him. On the cross, there is one who recognizes who Jesus really is and asks him to remember him when He comes into His Kingdom. May we have the same humility of knowing that we are a sinner and need a savior, and cry out to him to remember us when He comes into his kingdom!

Stop making anything else King of your life. This can include political parties or politicians. It can include sports or work or your phone or gaming or pornography or laziness or many other things. This is what the feast day of Christ the King is about. Who is your king and does he reign in your heart?

We had a small electrical fire in the school. It was a part of the heating/radiator system. Almost no damage was done, but thank you to the faculty and staff and students for responding as they should. All were kept safe and work is being done to fix the issue and check the other electric parts.

A reminder, please stop putting the Mass attendance cards in the collection. You need to have your child bring them back to the priest at the end of Mass. Yes, I've heard people complain about it and that we are the only Parish that does this. I want a relationship with you and your families and this helps to build it. I'm giving a time of buffering for people to get used to it but eventually, I will stop accepting them if they're in the collection if you attend St. Francis.

We have a couple of projects that will be in the works with the doors of the church in the near future. One will be putting glass on the interior door inserts so that we can see into the entryway. Another will be putting locking mechanisms on the doors that will allow us to lock them for safety reasons and still allow people to get out. Please be patient as we work to make us all safer.

As many of you know the organ was affected by lightning striking the tower of the church in May. We are finally ready to move forward with fixing that. They will take the console to their shop to do the work and bring us a temporary electric organ in the meantime. Again, please be patient as we work on this project to better our church.

Another project has been finished. If you look up in the church, you will see what used to be dark black windows in the peak near the ceilings above the apostles. They are now lit up by spotlights to show their glorious color and beauty. Thank you to all who made that possible. So much good stuff going on to continue to better our parish community and church and school.

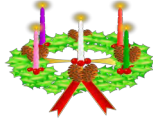

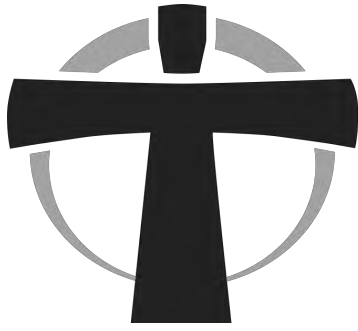
