First Sunday of Advent

NOVEMBER 30, 2025

Isaiah 2:1-5; Romans 3:11-14;
Matthew 24:37-44

During this year, our Gospel will usually be taken from Matthew. Today our Scripture readings are: Isaiah 2: 1-5; Romans 13:11-14; and Matthew 24:37-44.

Isaiah hoped for justice, joy, and peace. He longed for the day when mankind would make plows out of their swords, and vine-trimmers out of their spears. He longed for the day when all people would be united in respect for each other and in the love of the Lord. But Isaiah did not see that day; neither have we.

St. Paul, in the second reading, says that our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed. The time of justice, joy, and peace is nearer. Perfect justice and peace must await the Second (Glorious) Coming of the Lord. Meanwhile, however, it is “closer,” because we become a holier people, a more loving people, a people who seek to radiate hope for justice and peace.

The Gospel selection is very similar to that of two Sundays ago. It speaks of the sudden coming of the Day of the Lord. This glorious Second Coming of Christ is often called the “Parousia” (pah-roo-SEE-uh.)

We don’t know when the Lord will come; but we must always be prepared. We prepare by living each day as best we can. Each day, we try to become the person God wants us to be. Each day we try to spread the light of the Lord by our lives.

Let us be an Advent people, a people of hope and joy. We must live in an imperfect world, but we must seek to make it perfect. We do this by showing what Christ means in our lives.

1ST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

We never know the day nor the hour we may be taken home to God. I am very well aware of this in my life. It has always been how I live. Live like this is your last day, but that also means always be prepared to give an account to the Lord. Always have your life and heart ready to meet God.

Speaking of this mentality, it has now been one year. I say it's like an anniversary or even a new birthday. November 23, 2024 was when I went to the ER for my heart attacks. November 27, 2024 is when I had my quadruple bypass open heart surgery. These are days I will not forget. I have so much to be thankful for and always will be grateful to God for this life. I want to thank all of you for your continued prayers.

I thank you also for your patience in my returning to ministry. Even after returning, surgery again, other injuries to recover from, including PT for my knee and ankle. (Thank you Nathan Lunt for working with me). It has been a long recovery and lots of setbacks and much to heal from. Thank you for your patience in getting back to you or not keeping up at times. I finally am feeling a lot better and getting my energy back. I am not 100 percent, but I am heading in the right direction finally.

I am so grateful for your love and prayers and cards of support. They mean the world to me. I hope you and your families had a great Thanksgiving Day. I pray it was a time of unity, joy, fun, family and food. Happy Thanksgiving to you all!

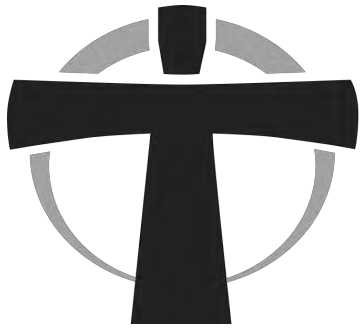
The Ladies of St. Francis wish everyone a blessed and healthy Christmas season and a Happy New Year! We hope you can join us when our meetings resume in March 2026!
