Dedication of the Lateran Basilica

NOVEMBER 9, 2025

Ezekiel 47:1-2,8-9,12;
1 Corinthians 3:9c-11,16-17; John 2:13-22

The center of our life in Christ is the church building. It is nothing but stone or brick or wood, but it is the place where we encounter the Lord in his sacraments. We are born into Christ's Body there; we are nourished with his Body and Blood there; we offer perfect praise to our Father through Jesus Christ there; we are cleansed of our sins there; we are married there or ordained there; and our bodies are brought there after our death to be honored and then to be buried to await the resurrection.

"St. John Lateran" is a misnomer. The real name of this church is the "Cathedral of the Most Holy Savior." It is the pope's Cathedral in Rome. When the Emperor Constantine gave the Church freedom in the Fourth Century, he gave the pope the property which had belonged to the Laterani family. The popes lived in the Lateran palace for a thousand years. Next door we built the Cathedral. It became the baptismal Church of ancient Rome. Though Rome had many churches, everyone was baptized here. The magnificent baptistry (larger than most churches in the United States) was dedicated to St. John the Baptist. Thus many people began calling the Church after the family and after the baptistry: Thus the misnomer "St. John Lateran!"

Our first reading is a vision of water flowing from the temple: first a trickle, then a stream, then a torrent and a flood. The reading is intended to recall baptism with its life-giving waters. We become the Church through baptism, and we bear abundant fruit.

The second reading tells us that we are God's temple! We honor buildings, but we should remember that building will pass away. But we, the Church, the Body of Christ, are that living temple of Christ. Christ truly dwells in us and among us. The motive for every virtue, and especially for the virtue of purity, should be that we always want to honor our bodies as temples of God.

The gospel is Jesus' cleansing of the temple. Good Jews realized that there were problems of merchandising in the temple. They also knew that the high priestly family during Jesus' time was corrupt. Some thought that the Messiah would cleanse the existing temple; others thought it would be destroyed and a new temple would come from heaven. (This is the view of the Book of Revelation.) Jesus speaks of the temple of his Body: He will rise from the dead after three days. And from his death and resurrection will come the new temple, the Church.

32ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

We have a unique weekend again for Sunday with the Dedication of St. John Lateran as the feast day we celebrate. In our readings this week, the prophet Ezekiel offers a vision of a life-giving river flowing from the temple—water that renews, heals, and brings life wherever it goes.

This river is not merely symbolic of nature's vitality but of God's grace flowing into a broken world. The image reminds us that true renewal begins at the very heart of worship, from the presence of God Himself. Wherever God's Spirit flows, there is restoration, abundance, and hope. We, as the Church—the living temple of the Holy Spirit—are called to be channels of that same life-giving grace in our world today.

In the Gospel, Jesus cleanses the temple, driving out the money changers and reminding the people that His Father's house is a place of prayer and holiness. His righteous anger is not about destruction but about purification—calling us back to what truly matters. When Jesus declares that He will raise the temple in three days, He points to His own body as the new and everlasting dwelling of God among us. Just as the river in Ezekiel flows from the temple, so grace now flows from Christ Himself into the hearts of believers. This week, let us ask the Lord to cleanse our own temples—our hearts—so that His life-giving waters may flow freely through us into the world.

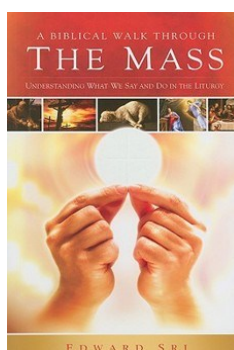
St. Francis Fall Harvest Food Drive

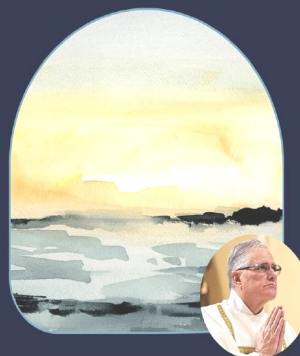

Knights of Columbus 2026 Calendar Raffle

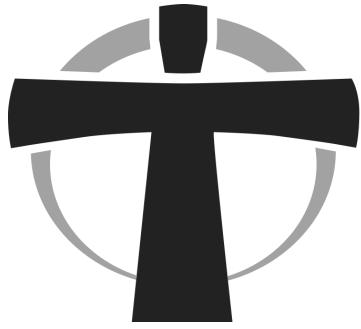


