Zephaniah 2:3,3:12-13; 1 Corinthians 1:26-31;
Matthew 5:1-12a

Matthew's Gospel is the most "Jewish" of the Gospels. It is structured around five great sermons or discourses of Jesus. The reason: There were five scrolls or books of Moses; Matthew shows Jesus as the "new Moses." The first of the sermons is the Sermon on the Mount. Moses went up on the mountain to receive the Holy Torah; Jesus goes up the mountain to proclaim the "new Law."

If we add the infancy story of Jesus and the Passion-Death-Resurrection narrative to the five sermons, we have *seven* units. The perfect number to the Jews was seven! These are but a few examples of the "Jewishness" of Matthew. Matthew wants to show Jesus as the fulfillment of all the promises made to the Jews.

Today's Gospel contain the opening words of the very first sermon recorded of Jesus, the Sermon on the Mount. The Beatitudes can be considered in many different ways. They may be an entirely new "value system": Jesus blesses humility; the world blesses pride. Jesus blesses the meek; the world extols the self-assertive. Jesus blesses those who are sorry for sin ("mourn"); the world never wants to admit a mistake. Jesus blesses the clean of heart; the world cherishes the risqué, the bawdy, and the immoral.

The Beatitudes might also be considered as the process of conversion: "Poor in spirit" means those who have nothing else to rely on; they must turn to God. Unless we realize our need for God, we won't turn to him. "Sorrowing" really means those who are sorry for sin. We must realize our sinfulness and want to turn away. We must hunger and thirst for holiness in order that the Lord may fill us with his saving grace. Then, in turn, if we show mercy to others, God will show us mercy.

The first reading, from Zephaniah, urges us to seek humility and justice. The second reading tells us that we aren't too sophisticated or wise; but no matter! God chooses those who are nothing to show his own powerful grace. Realize your need of God, your need to reform; hunger for holiness. The Lord will fill you.

4TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

On the hillside, Jesus looks out and blesses the unlikely ones—the poor in spirit, the meek, the merciful, the peacemakers. He does not congratulate the powerful or the self-satisfied. He names as blessed those who know their need for God and are willing to trust Him anyway. That word blessed is not a polite compliment; it is a promise. In a world that measures success by strength, noise, and winning, Jesus points to a quieter path. The Beatitudes invite us to believe that God is already at work in places that look small, hidden, or even broken, and that the Kingdom is closer than we think.

Zephaniah echoes that same hope when he speaks of a “humble and lowly people” who seek refuge in the name of the Lord. God does not abandon the remnant; He builds something new with those who choose humility over pride and faithfulness over fear. Here in our own community, that promise still stands. When we act with gentleness, speak truth without harm, and place our trust not in ourselves but in the Lord, we become that remnant— a quiet witness to a God who delights in lifting up the lowly and filling them with joy.

Next week while Fr. Ken is still gone, and there is no one to reach out to for help with coverage right now, I have asked the Deacons to do a communion service at the 5:30 p.m. Mass times Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. I hope you all understand and I thank the Deacons for their continued help and goodness.

Next weekend we will have a missionary priest from Cross Catholic Outreach here to talk about the wonderful work that they do. Cross Catholic Outreach is a Catholic relief and development organization that partners with bishops and local churches to serve the poor in developing countries. It provides critical aid such as food, clean water, housing, education, and orphan support while promoting long-term, sustainable solutions. Rooted in Catholic social teaching, its mission is to transform lives and communities through faith-filled compassion and solidarity. Please welcome Fr. Frank Iacona!

Lastly, we are working towards some good things here at St. Francis. We finally have made some progress towards our green space. We have the opportunity to tear down two houses very soon. We will move forward with that project with the hopes of the last two sooner than later. Please keep this project in your prayers for it to come to fruition.

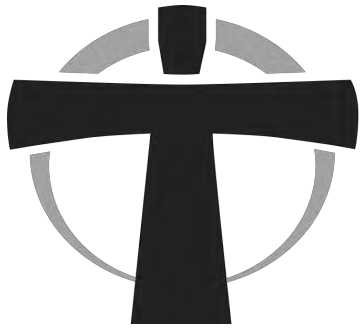
