Second Sunday of Lent

MARCH 1, 2026

Genesis 12:1-4a; 2 Timothy 1:8b-10;
Matthew 17:1-9

Remember that Lent is devoted to baptism and baptismal renewal. Last week we saw that baptism does not mean freedom from temptation. As the Lord was tempted, so will we be tempted. We must daily struggle to overcome.

This week we see the profound meaning of our baptism: Through baptism, we are transformed into the image of Christ himself! But don't expect that everything is "glory."

Only once during his earthly life did Jesus allow his divinity to shine through his humanity. He was transfigured before three of the apostles. At all other times he looked like an ordinary human being. We may not "see" our divine baptismal dignity, but it is there; and we must reverence that image with humility and gratitude.

Our first reading tells of the call of Abraham. All nations and peoples will be blessed through a descendant of his. Abraham's call was great; our call to baptism is greater. We share in the blessing promised to him.

Our second reading tells us that the Gospel will also mean hardship. Jesus was divine; yet he suffered and died on the cross. We share his divine life; and we, too, must carry our crosses in union with him. Let us not rebel against our daily crosses; let us bear them joyfully.

The experience of the Transfiguration was intended to strengthen the disciples for the ordeal of the cross. It was to help them to see that the Messiah was not the triumphant and over-powering person expected, but was a suffering Messiah. If we want to follow Christ, we must follow him in his cross as well as in his resurrection.

2ND SUNDAY OF LENT

In this Second Sunday of Lent, we hear the powerful call of Abram: “Go forth from the land of your kinsfolk to a land that I will show you.” Abram does not receive a map, a timeline, or guarantees—only a promise. Yet he goes. That simple act of trust becomes the foundation of salvation history. During these Lenten days, the Lord speaks that same word to us: “Go.” Go from what is comfortable. Go from old habits of sin. Go from self-reliance into deeper trust. Lent is not merely about giving something up; it is about stepping forward in faith. Like Abram, we may not see clearly where the Lord is leading, but we walk by faith because we trust the One who calls us.

In the Gospel, the disciples glimpse the glory of Christ in the Transfiguration. On the mountain, Peter wants to stay— “Lord, it is good that we are here.” Who wouldn’t want to remain in that radiant moment? Yet Jesus leads them back down the mountain, toward Jerusalem and ultimately toward the Cross. The glory they witness is real, but it is inseparable from sacrifice. Lent invites us up the mountain to prayer, to behold the Lord more clearly, so that we may have the strength to follow Him down the mountain into daily life, carrying our crosses with hope. If we listen to Him, as the Father commands, we will discover that beyond every cross lies resurrection, and beyond every act of trust, a deeper share in His glory.

I want to thank the Quilters for their donation to finish the light project. We had a generous parishioner who donated all the supplies and had planned to get it done if timing ever worked out, but the quilters paid for the installation. I thank the anonymous parishioner and the quilters for making this happen: the lights around all the side altars, Pieta, Sacred Heart, Mary, and St. Anthony. This is also the lights behind the stained glass in the vaulted ceiling, called the clerestory. Look up next time you are in Church. Those stained-glass windows have always been there, but they capped off the exterior windows a long time ago because they were all broken. Now with these spotlights behind them we get to see these beautiful windows that add so much to our space.

We also have been working to put glass into the entry doors for increased safety and the door locking mechanisms. As this project gets completed, I am sure there will be kinks to be worked out for locking and unlocking. Soon the Church and Parish Center doors will lock and unlock themselves at set times. As soon as that is all set, I will let you all know and then ask that you don’t do anything with the doors after that time for locking and unlocking. These upgrades will make us all safer and save a lot of time and effort. So many good things happening here at St. Francis and it’s all thanks to you and your generous response to the Lord.

Did you know that St. Francis has had quilters for over 100 years?

They have donated quilts to the card parties and picnics and the Christmas Bazaar. They also take in privately owned quilts that need hand-quilting. All funds received are donated to special church projects.

In recent years the quilters have helped pay for a portion of the bathrooms in the basement of the parish center; \$3,000 was donated to the church heating and air conditioning, and most recently they paid for the light project for the statues and stained glass. Their work not only graces the beds of those who win quilts but it also dresses the table of Jesus. The lace altar cloth that is on the altar and the one used at Christmas were made from donated lace. Quilters made them into the altar cloths and many toppers were made; also the lace for the gift table was made by one of the quilters. They also mend vestments for Father. We also have taken over making the baby bibs for baptisms.

The quilters not only make beautiful quilts but they enjoy what they do and enjoy time spent with members of the parish and others who joined the quilters.

They are always in need of others to join them, even if you just want to learn how to sew and quilt. No experience needed, just a desire to learn.

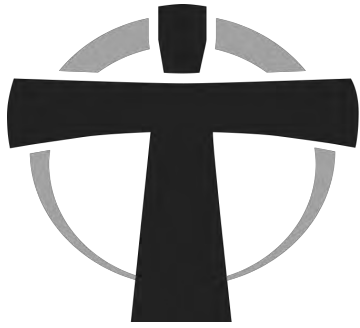
