Fourth Sunday of Lent

MARCH 15, 2026

1 Samuel 16:1b,6-7,10-13a;
Ephesians 5:8-14; John 9:1-41 or 9: 1, 6-9,
13-17, 34

The Fourth Sunday of Lent is often called "*Laetare Sunday*." (It's pronounced "lay-TAH-ray".) *Laetare* is the first word of the Latin Entrance Antiphon for today. It means, "Rejoice!" In the ancient Church, today was kind of a "Mardi Gras," since fasting did not begin until Monday after the Fourth Sunday of Lent. So they rejoiced. Perhaps, later on in the history of the Church, they rejoiced because Lent was half over.

But we should really rejoice because our Elect are almost at their goal of the Easter sacraments of baptism, confirmation, and eucharist! During the rest of Lent, flowers are forbidden in church; today they are permitted. During the rest of Lent, the use of the organ and other instruments is forbidden (except if necessary to sustain the singing); today they are permitted. Let us rejoice!

Through baptism, we receive the gift of faith which enables us to see as God sees. This is the theme of today's Scripture readings. The first reading is the story of the anointing of David as King of Israel. Samuel had been told that one of the sons of Jesse was to be king. He assumed that it would be the oldest, strongest, and biggest. It wasn't. He went through all the sons of Jesse and did not find the Lord's choice. Finally, they called in the last son of Jesse from tending the flocks. Thereupon Samuel anointed David as king. God does not see as humans see; he reads the heart! He chooses whom he will!

The second reading tells us that we were once darkness, but now we are light. Once we wandered aimlessly. Life had no meaning. Now everything fits together in the context of faith. Now we are light in the Lord.

The long Gospel story is of the man born blind. Jews, like Catholics, believed that God would often send or permit afflictions in order to purify a person's faith. But they believed that God could not send blindness. The reason was that a blind person could not read the Torah, and reading the Torah was the only way to salvation! Therefore blindness had to be caused by sin!

Jesus says this is not so; the man's blindness is to show forth God's glory. When Jesus smeared mud on the man's eyes, the word translated "smeared" is actually "anointed." It has sacramental overtones. The man washes in the pool of Siloam and can see. The symbolic meaning is that we shall see as God sees through baptism.

At the end of the story Jesus remarks that many blind people of this world think that they see. These are the sophisticated, self-satisfied, arrogant people of this world. They are blind. But he came to make the blind see: to give the real meaning of life to all.

Today, we celebrate the second of the Scrutinies with our Elect. As we pray that the eyes of faith will be opened in our Elect, let us also pray that we shall always see with eyes of faith, and that Christ will always be the light of our lives.

4TH SUNDAY OF LENT

In the First Book of Samuel, the Lord reminds Samuel of something we all need to hear: “Not as man sees does God see.” When Samuel looked at Jesse’s sons, he naturally assumed the strongest and most impressive must be the one God had chosen. Yet it was David—the youngest, the shepherd, the one overlooked—whom the Lord had anointed. God sees the heart. We live in a world that is quick to judge by appearances, success, or status. But the Lord looks deeper. He sees faith, humility, kindness, and a willingness to trust Him. The story reminds us that God often works through people and places others might overlook.

In the Gospel of John, Jesus heals the man born blind, but the greater miracle is not only that the man receives sight—it is that he comes to see who Jesus truly is. Meanwhile, those who believed they could see clearly—the Pharisees—remain spiritually blind. This Gospel invites us to reflect on our own vision. Do we recognize Christ at work in our lives, even in unexpected ways? Like the man in the Gospel, our faith often grows step by step as we encounter the Lord. As we continue our Lenten journey, we might ask the Lord to open our eyes—to see Him more clearly, to recognize His grace around us, and to see others as God sees them: with love, dignity, and possibility.

This last week we had a phenomenal speaker on how to protect Catholic families online, Dr. Peter Kleponis. I wanted to thank Dr. Kleponis. What great information that every parent needs to hear, but especially Catholic parents. I do have to say I was very disappointed in the number of people that attended. I know we had to cancel one night because of travel issues for the speaker, but every parent in our parish and school should have been there. The information was invaluable. When we bring a speaker for a mission or any subject, I promise only the best. Please make these events a greater priority. For those who still want to watch, the talk is on our parish Facebook page for the next 30 days and then it will be gone. I highly encourage every parent to watch.

Lastly, We need some school families to step up to help make the parish picnic a reality. I don’t know how we got to this little a number and no one was recruited sooner, but we need people to step up. This is not only a great moment to evangelize and bring people to our property that otherwise may never come here, but it is also a huge fundraiser for the school. Please prayerfully consider stepping up. This is a great way to be a good steward for the parish and school. Contact me or Mrs. Radel if you are willing.

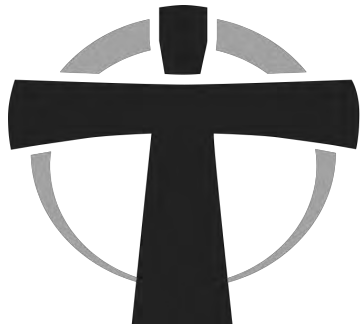
