1 Samuel 16:1b,6-7,10-13a;  
 Ephesians 5:8-14; John 9:1-41 or 9: 1, 6-9,  
 13-17, 34

The Fourth Sunday of Lent is often called "*Laetare Sunday*." (It's pronounced "lay-TAH-ray".) Laetare is the first word of the Latin Entrance Antiphon for today. It means, "Rejoice!" In the ancient Church, today was kind of a "Mardi Gras," since fasting did not begin until Monday after the Fourth Sunday of Lent. So they rejoiced. Perhaps, later on in the history of the Church, they rejoiced because Lent was half over.

But we should really rejoice because our Elect are almost at their goal of the Easter sacraments of baptism, confirmation, and eucharist! During the rest of Lent, flowers are forbidden in church; today they are permitted. During the rest of Lent, the use of the organ and other instruments is forbidden (except if necessary to sustain the singing); today they are permitted. Let us rejoice!

Through baptism, we receive the gift of faith which enables us to see as God sees. This is the theme of today's Scripture readings. The first reading is the story of the anointing of David as King of Israel. Samuel had been told that one of the sons of Jesse was to be king. He assumed that it would be the oldest, strongest, and biggest. It wasn't. He went through all the sons of Jesse and did not find the Lord's choice. Finally, they called in the last son of Jesse from tending the flocks. Thereupon Samuel anointed David as king. God does not see as humans see; he reads the heart! He chooses whom he will!

The second reading tells us that we were once darkness, but now we are light. Once we wandered aimlessly. Life had no meaning. Now everything fits together in the context of faith. Now we are light in the Lord.

The long Gospel story is of the man born blind. Jews, like Catholics, believed that God would often send or permit afflictions in order to purify a person's faith. But they believed that God could not send blindness. The reason was that a blind person could not read the Torah, and reading the Torah was the only way to salvation! Therefore blindness had to be caused by sin!

Jesus says this is not so; the man's blindness is to show forth God's glory. When Jesus smeared mud on the man's eyes, the word translated "smeared" is actually "anointed." It has sacramental overtones. The man washes in the pool of Siloam and can see. The symbolic meaning is that we shall see as God sees through baptism.

At the end of the story Jesus remarks that many blind people of this world think that they see. These are the sophisticated, self-satisfied, arrogant people of this world. They are blind. But he came to make the blind see: to give the real meaning of life to all.

Today, we celebrate the second of the Scrutinies with our Elect. As we pray that the eyes of faith will be opened in our Elect, let us also pray that we shall always see with eyes of faith, and that Christ will always be the light of our lives.

**Dear Parishioners,**

We gather this weekend to celebrate the Fourth Sunday in our season of Lent. The entrance antiphon for our Mass seems to invite us to “rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning.” With this antiphon for this 4th Sunday of Lent, the Church celebrates what is called “Laetare Sunday.” The word “Laetare comes from this entrance antiphon and means to “rejoice.” This halfway point and respite in our penitential season is marked by rose vestments instead of violet. There is a joyful note at this point in Lent because of the ancient practice of “handing over” the Apostles Creed to the Elect (non-baptized), the last and decisive step for those preparing for baptism. This Sunday is also called “Rose Sunday, which comes from the papal blessing of the golden rose, a symbol of spiritual joy. The floral spray was blessed by the pope on the Fourth Sunday of Lent and sent to some notable person or institution to acknowledge and honor special service or loyalty. There is a small container of musk and balsam in the heart of the sprays principle rose. And so today, we find the priest wearing “rose colored vestments” to designate the rejoicing that we feel as Easter gets closer and closer.

This Sunday we also have our Second Scrutiny celebration with our Elect. On this particular Sunday, we use the Scripture of the man born blind. Jesus encounters this man born blind as he traveled along the way. Question was asked, “Who sinned to bring about this blindness, this man or his parents?” Because he was unable to read the Torah, it was understood that some sin must have caused this blindness since God could not cause it. And so there is a major discussion concerning who caused this blindness. Then Jesus does something unexpected. He puts clay on his eyes and tells him to go wash. “So, he went and washed and came back, able to see.” Then we have a major discussion that involved this blind man, his parents, and the Pharisees who were trying to find fault to criticize Jesus. What happens next is a conversion story, namely, the conversion story of the blind man. He goes from questioning to stating that Jesus was a prophet. After further questioning and being accused of all things by the Pharisees, he states, “one thing I do know is that I was blind but now I see.” Through it all, they even questioned his parents. But the blind man remains firm and in spite of the ridicule, he is steadfast in his profession of faith that Jesus healed him. And because of that steadfastness, they argued, “you were born totally in sin, and are you trying to teach us? And they threw him out.” And this is when Jesus encounters him again and is asked, “Do you believe in the Son of Man?” He answered Jesus by saying, “Who is He, sir, that I may believe in Him” Then Jesus reveals Himself to the man born blind and says to him, you have seen him and the one speaking with you is he. And thus, Jesus makes a profound statement to His audience, “I came into this world for judgment, so that those who do not see might see, and those who do see might become blind. Hoping and praying that this conversion story is ours. Our Elect will be participating in their second scrutiny which prays for their eyes to be opened, and they profess their faith in Jesus Christ. Soon and very soon we will journey toward the baptismal waters where they will encounter our Lord and Savior, telling them to go wash in the pool and they will truly be able to see.
