Fifth Sunday of Lent

MARCH 22, 2026

Ezekiel 37:12-14; Romans 8:8-11;
John 11:1-45 or 11: 3-7, 17, 20-27, 33b-45

In Jewish expectation, the most obvious sign of the coming of the Messiah was the resurrection of the dead. Hebrews did not distinguish between “body” and “soul;” those are Greek philosophical categories. To the Hebrews, a human person was an animated body; if there was to be life after death, it had to be by way of the resurrection of the body.

Early Judaism knew nothing of life after death; late Judaism developed the idea of life after death because of the expectation of the Messiah. The Messiah would bring an era of perfect joy to this earth. The living would live forever. But what about the dead? They thought that it would be unjust of God not to raise the righteous who had died before the Messiah came.

The expectation is expressed in the first reading. In the Gospel, the seventh and last of Jesus’ “signs” is the raising of Lazarus. But note that this is a sign of our own resurrection to glory. Lazarus would die again. But those who believe in Jesus will never taste eternal death. Jesus promises that he has conquered death. Whoever lives and believes in him will conquer any fear of death; he is assured that he will live forever in the glory of Christ.

In the second reading the contrast is made between “spirit” and “flesh.” “Spirit” here does not mean “soul,” and “flesh” here does not mean “body.” Here, “flesh” means the entire human person considered as living without Christ; i.e. the human person under the reign of sin.

“Spirit” means the entire human person considered as living under the reign of Christ. A good synonym for “spirit” would be “grace.” Because we live in Christ (in grace) we shall live forever; we shall rise from the dead bodily because we share the life of Christ spiritually.

If we share with Christ, we must show this in our lives. We must show by our attitude, our words, and our actions, that we believe that we have conquered death; we must be a people of joy who radiate the power of Christ’s love.

Today we celebrate the third and last of the Scrutinies with our Elect. The emphasis is on the resurrection which they will experience in their baptism on Holy Saturday. With them, let us pledge that we shall daily die to self and that we shall daily rise to share the life and love of the risen Christ. Our share in the resurrection of Christ in this life is our life of grace.

5TH SUNDAY OF LENT

As we draw closer to the great mystery of Easter, the readings for this Fifth Sunday of Lent invite us to stand at the threshold between death and life, despair and hope. The prophet Ezekiel speaks to a people who believed their story was over – exiled, broken, and without a future. Yet the Lord declares, “O my people, I will open your graves and have you rise from them.” This is not merely a promise for some distant day; it is God’s assurance that no tomb we find ourselves in – whether grief, sin, fear, or weariness – is beyond His power to open. The breath of God, His very Spirit, is placed within us even now, restoring what feels lost and reviving what seems beyond repair.

That promise finds its fullness in the Gospel account of the raising of Lazarus. Jesus does not remain distant from human suffering; He enters into it, weeping with those who mourn. And yet, He does not leave things there. Standing before the tomb, He calls Lazarus by name, commanding life where death had taken hold. This is the same voice that calls out to each of us. As we continue our Lenten journey, we are invited to trust that Christ is already at work in the dark places of our lives, ready to bring forth new life. But like Lazarus, we must be willing to emerge, to let go of the grave clothes that bind us. May we hear His voice this week and respond with faith, stepping into the freedom and life He so deeply desires for us.

Passiontide begins today. The fifth Sunday of Lent is often referred to as "Passion Sunday." Not Palm Sunday where we read the passion. This marks the start of a two-week period leading up to Easter, focusing on the passion and suffering of Jesus Christ. Passiontide has an intensification of the Lenten observances and focus on the events of Holy Week. We cover the crosses and statues with purple cloth during this time as a symbol of mourning and preparation for the sorrowful mysteries of Christ’s Passion. The crosses and statues remind us of heaven and the resurrection, while veiling them helps us to focus on the suffering and passion. Let us use this time to direct our hearts and walk with Jesus through all the moments of the next week to prepare ourselves for His death and rest in the tomb, while keeping in mind that the story doesn't end there.

Lastly, the north doors of the parish hall no longer need to be locked or unlocked with a key. They are on a timer and will open at 5:30 a.m. and close at 10 p.m. **DO NOT** lock or unlock these doors anymore. Soon the Church doors will follow and be on a timer and will not need to be locked or unlocked with the deadbolts. Thank you again to those who made this project possible. It is of utmost importance to keep us all, especially our kids, as well as our Church building safe.

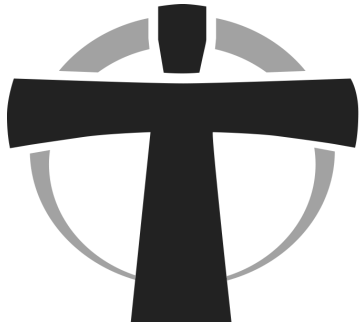

St. Francis Solanus School Teachers Complete Rigorous Literacy Training Program

Three dedicated St. Francis Solanus School educators — Lesley Failor, Sarah Hull, and Jamie Marshall — have completed the **LETRS (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling)** program after two years of study and professional development. Mrs. Failor teaches First Grade. Mrs. Hull teaches Kindergarten, and Mrs. Marshall teaches Literacy Intervention for First through Fourth Grade. The training, which focuses on the science of reading and evidence-based literacy instruction, requires an average minimum of 160 hours of coursework and study, to complete.

Through this intensive program, the teachers strengthened their understanding of how students learn to read. By participating in this extensive professional learning opportunity, Mrs. Failor, Mrs. Hull, and Mrs. Marshall have deepened their knowledge of effective reading instruction and gained practical strategies to better support students in developing strong literacy skills. Their commitment to completing this rigorous program demonstrates a dedication not only to professional growth but also to helping every student become a confident and capable reader.
