Third Sunday of Lent

MARCH 8, 2026

Exodus 17:3-7; Romans 5:1-2,5-8;
John 4:5-42 or 4: 5-15, 19b-26, 39a, 40-42

Lent is devoted to baptism and baptismal renewal. Last week we saw that our baptism meant that we must be transfigured into the image of Christ. Before that, we saw that baptism does not mean freedom from temptation. As the Lord was tempted, so will we be tempted. We must daily struggle to overcome. Today we see that baptism is God's gracious gift to us. We don't deserve redemption, but Christ died for us even when we were sinners; he calls us to share his life-giving spirit through baptism.

Today we celebrate the first of the Scrutinies with our Elect. The Scrutinies are a time of soul-searching and repentance; we seek to uncover all that is weak, defective, or sinful; we offer ourselves to the Lord in order to strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. In the ancient Church the Scrutinies were tests that the catechumens had to pass before they were accounted worthy to be baptized in the Easter Vigil. Even though the Church has relaxed its discipline, we should "scrutinize" ourselves to see if we live up to what God wants of us.

In this context let us look at the Scriptures: The Israelites complained that they were parched with thirst. God gave them water from the rock to drink. They did not pass the test of faith, but were a grumbling, griping, whining people. In spite of this, God had mercy on them.

(Rabbinical writings said that the rock followed them through their wandering in the desert, and that they had fresh water whenever Moses struck the rock; St. Paul takes this up in his epistles and says that the rock that followed them was Christ – the source of living water!)

If we think we deserve God's mercy, we should look within ourselves. We are sinners. If we have been preserved from sin, it is God's grace and not our own unaided efforts. Paul tells us that God sent his Son to save us when we were his enemies by sin! If we ever get discouraged because of our weaknesses, let us have hope because of the mercy of Christ!

The long Gospel is the story of the Samaritan woman at the well. Jesus asks her for a drink; she makes a smart remark; Jesus tells her that she should be asking him for a drink of "living" water. This is a play on words: She understands him to mean "fresh, flowing, or spring" water. He really means the water of the Holy Spirit conferred in baptism.

Let us examine ourselves: Do we appreciate God's mercy? Do we take him for granted? Do we presume on his mercy? Are we like the Israelites? Let us be conscious of the "living water" of the Holy Spirit given us in baptism; let us live in hope and confidence, but not in presumption.

Third Sunday of Lent, March 8, 2026

Dear Parishioners,

This weekend we gather to celebrate the 3rd Sunday in our Season of Lent. For the next three Sundays, we will be hearing the Scripture readings intended for the scrutinies of those preparing for the Sacraments of Initiation at Easter. In the olden days of the Church the scrutiny were tests that those who were preparing for Baptism would undertake. These scrutinies were given to the Elect (unbaptized) to check if they were ready for the Sacraments. Not only were they tested on their knowledge of the Church but also on how they were living their lives. Not sure how many of us contemporary Catholics could have passed these tests for they were true scrutinies. Thankfully today, these scrutinies are now our prayers for the Elect as they prepare for the Easter sacraments.

In our gospel for this weekend, we hear about Jesus' encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well. This encounter becomes a conversion experience for this woman who would come to this well every day to draw water. Well, this day would be a day for her to remember. The encounter starts off with casual conversation with Jesus asking her for a drink. Then this leads to a deeper conversation about the living water that Jesus would provide. Interested, the woman says, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water." Then the discussion continues and Jesus reveals some things about her past. But Jesus also reveals to her that He is the Messiah whom they were discussing. The woman, filled with amazement at this encounter, goes into town and becomes an evangelizer, spreading the good news about Jesus to everyone she would meet. Many of the Samaritans of that town began to believe in Him because of the word of that woman who testified, "He told me everything that I have done." And many of the people in that town believed in Him as they came to hear Him speak. Then the gospel concludes, "We no longer believe because of your word; for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the Savior of the world." This brief encounter captures the conversion of heart that filled not only this woman whom Jesus encountered but also the lives of the people in that town who heard Him speak. These people were thirsting for something, and Jesus satisfied that thirst for them. Thus, it is with any conversion of heart.

Next Saturday, March 14, our third grade students will be going to the Cathedral in Springfield to celebrate their Confirmation and First Communion with the Bishop. I ask that you pray for them and keep them safe on their journey to and from the Cathedral. Then on that Sunday, March 15, these same students will gather here at St. Peter to celebrate their sacrament with us at the 11:00 a.m. Mass. I want to congratulate them as we pray for them this next weekend.

Then we have our annual corporate meeting with the diocese, an event that is mandatory for all pastors. This meeting will be held in Springfield on March 17-18. Because of this meeting, THERE WILL BE NO MORNING MASS ON WEDNESDAY, March 18. We will have confessions and Mass that Wednesday evening. Again, please mark your calendars for these two days.

I have another chemo treatment this Monday, March 9. Please keep me in your prayers. Thank you!

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Soon our diocese will take up The Catholic Relief Services Collection. Your support for this collection provides aid to vulnerable people affected by war, natural disasters, and exploitation.

Human trafficking is the exploitation of a person through forced labor, domestic servitude, or commercial sex. It affects women, children, and men of all ages everywhere in the world, including in the United States. Although some victims of human trafficking are also smuggled across national borders, human trafficking involves anyone who is compelled by force, fraud, or coercion to provide work or service, regardless of nationality or citizenship or geographic location.

Poverty, isolation from the support of family and friends, and cultural or language barriers are among the factors that place people at risk of trafficking. Native Americans are particularly vulnerable to trafficking and violence, as many live in poverty away from reservations or tribal lands. Meanwhile, many reservations cover vast rural territories and have few law enforcement resources to aid victims of trafficking and bring perpetrators to justice.

In light of these challenges, successful antitrafficking efforts must involve communities that can recognize the signs of trafficking and provide direct assistance to victims. School teachers, parish staff and clergy, and health care providers at community clinics — with training to recognize the signs of human trafficking in their own communities— can be effective in combatting the exploitation of those they serve.

With funds received through The Catholic Relief Services Collection, the office of Migration and Refugee Services (MRS) of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops launched a pilot program to combat human trafficking among indigenous Hawaiians in the Diocese of Honolulu and on the St. Regis Mohawk Reservation in the Diocese of Ogdensburg, New York. Working with local partners, MRS staff assessed the challenges facing those communities, trained local leaders to recognize the signs of human trafficking, and helped leaders establish networks to respond to the needs of victims.

Your support of The Catholic Relief Services Collection empowers and brings healing to communities affected by poverty and injustice. Your participation helps MRS and five other Catholic ministries to reveal Christ's love to victims of trafficking, war, and natural disaster, both around the world and here in the United States. 




