1 Kings 3:5,7-12; Romans 8:28-30;
 Matthew 13:44-52

Solomon was King David's son by Bathsheba. When he became king, he was overwhelmed by the number of people and the problems of ruling. When asked by God what one gift he desired, Solomon answered "an understanding heart." He prayed for real wisdom.

The lesson of the Gospel parable is that we should be willing to give everything we have if we find the greatest value of life.

In the ancient Middle East there were constant wars. (So what else is new?) A person wouldn't trust banks, for they might be taken over by an invader. If you had a treasure, you might bury it in a secret place on your land.

But suppose your family or clan was wiped out; generations later someone might discover the treasure you buried. That person would seek to buy the land before anyone else found out about it.

What is the greatest value of our lives? It is wisdom which puts everything in its proper place. True wisdom proceeds from faith. Faith sees that this world is important, but the world to come is more important. True wisdom orients everything in life toward our eternal goal of heaven.

True wisdom trusts God, even when things seem bleak. The second reading reminds us that all things will work together for good for those who love the Lord. Let us pray for true wisdom. Let us work each day for that wisdom which sees God's gracious purpose working in our lives, a wisdom which seeks to please him at every moment.

17TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In this Sunday's readings, Solomon stands before the Lord with the opportunity to ask for anything, yet he asks not for riches, power, or a long life, but for wisdom. What a beautiful reminder that the greatest gift we can seek is a heart that knows how to listen to God.

In the Gospel, Jesus compares the Kingdom of Heaven to a treasure hidden in a field and a pearl of great price, something so valuable that a person gladly gives up everything else to possess it. These parables challenge us to examine our own priorities. What do we treasure most? Too often our hearts become attached to things that cannot truly satisfy, while the Lord patiently invites us to discover that lasting joy is found only in Him.

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to seek the wisdom of Solomon and the wholehearted commitment of the merchant who found the pearl of great price. Faith is not simply one part of our lives; it is the lens through which we see everything else. When Christ becomes our greatest treasure, sacrifices become opportunities, generosity becomes natural, and service becomes a privilege rather than a burden. May we ask the Lord this week for the grace to recognize the priceless gift we have already received in our Catholic faith, to cherish the Eucharist as the greatest treasure entrusted to us, and to live each day with hearts that gladly choose Christ above all else. When we do, we discover that the Kingdom of Heaven is not merely a future promise, it is already taking root within us.

This weekend we welcome the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales for their Missionary appeal. The second collection this weekend will go to their community, unless the envelope it is in states the gift is for Alaska. Sr. JoAn grew up here at St. Francis Solanus and we thank her for her many years of religious life as a witness to the Gospel in a Franciscan way of life. Sister JoAn Schullian, formerly of Quincy, is celebrating her 70th Jubilee as a Franciscan Sister this year. It is the anniversary of her first profession of vows, which she made in 1956 as a member of the Hospital Sisters of St. Francis in Springfield. Sister JoAn, members of her family, and friends, will attend the 11 o'clock Mass here on July 26.

Sister JoAn was born in Quincy in 1935, the daughter of James and Margaret (Schmit) Schullian. She graduated from St. Francis Solanus School in 1949 and from Notre Dame High School in 1953 and entered the Hospital Sisters of St. Francis in Springfield in 1953. She earned degrees from Springfield College in Illinois, DePaul University, an MBA in Hospital Administration from Xavier University and other diplomas, including Medical Technology and Pastoral Studies.

During her long career she worked in Medical Technology, as a hospital lab supervisor and in hospital administration as well as a hospital chaplain in Pastoral Care Ministry and parish ministry.

Sister JoAn gives thanks to her parents, her religious superiors, to God for her Franciscan vocation, and to all who have helped her in her ministries of service.

This weekend we have the **Annual Mission Appeal** in our parish. Fr. Jacob Sundara Raju msfs from the missionaries of St. Francis de Sales will be the speaker for this appeal. In the homily he will speak about their mission work, mainly in India and several African countries. The congregation of the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales was founded in Annecy, France in 1837 as missionaries. They are now globally present in 29 countries with membership of more than 1200 priests. The missionaries work among the poor, disadvantaged, marginalized, and illiterate through children's homes, orphanages and schools. More than 2500 economically poor, semi-orphan or orphan children are cared for and educated in their 60 children's homes both in India and Africa. Empowering of poor and voiceless women also is one of our priorities. We also need funds for the seminarians' education. There are about 200 seminarians in different stages of formation in India and Africa. So, we ask your generous donations to continue the good work of the missionaries.

Annual Statement on Non-Discrimination

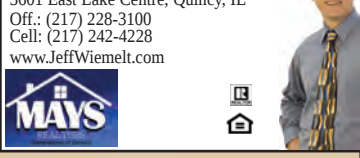
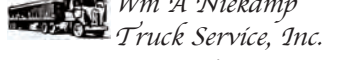
