Zechariah 9:9-10; Romans 8:9,11-13;
 Matthew 11:25-30

The first eight chapters of Zechariah date from 520 B.C. and concern the rebuilding of the temple after the Babylonian Captivity. But the last six chapters (from which today's first reading is taken) come from the time of Alexander the Great, i.e. around 333 B.C.

Alexander was young, arrogant, and brash. He was a great general, and he knew it. He intended to unite the entire world under his leadership! He loved to rub his enemies noses in the dirt and parade them in disgrace before his victorious army. In contrast, Zechariah sees a humble leader, one who will not come with force of weapons, but who will ride on the back of a donkey. His dominion will be one of peace and justice.

At the time of Jesus, many Jews were expecting a military Messiah, one who would establish the kingdom by force and power. Jesus says that we should learn of him, for he is gentle and humble of heart. He invites those who are burdened with life to come to him. His yoke will fit us well; it will not be like the yoke of a harsh taskmaster. He offers us rest.

The second reading is from the most consoling chapter in the entire Bible. Read it in its entirety! Today's selection reminds us that the spirit of Christ dwells in our hearts. We are not doomed to live according to the lowest and the meanest and the weakest.

("Flesh" means "following that tug downwards of original sin.") We are empowered to live in the "spirit" – in the strength of Christ's grace. With that grace, we can shoulder any burden.

14TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The prophet Zechariah paints a beautiful picture of the Messiah not arriving with armies, power, or earthly prestige, but humbly riding on a donkey, bringing peace to the nations. That image is fulfilled perfectly in Jesus Christ, who invites us to recognize that God's strength is revealed not through domination but through humble, sacrificial love. In a world that constantly tells us to strive harder, achieve more, and prove our worth, the Lord offers a different path. He comes to us with gentleness and mercy, inviting us to trust not in our own accomplishments but in His faithful presence. The Kingdom of God is built not on force, but on hearts that are willing to surrender themselves to Christ.

In the Gospel, Jesus extends one of the most comforting invitations in all of Scripture: "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest." Every one of us carries burdens—concerns for our families, worries about our health, grief, uncertainty, or the weight of our own sins. Jesus does not promise that those burdens will disappear overnight, but He does promise that we never carry them alone. When we place ourselves under His yoke, we discover that His way is not one of crushing obligation but of freedom, hope, and peace. As we gather each Sunday around the altar, may we lay our burdens before the Lord, allowing Him to strengthen our hearts so that we may leave renewed and ready to be His gentle presence in the lives of those we meet this week.

Altar Server Training: We are offering Server Training on the following dates and times. All training is done in the church. Only one day of training is required.

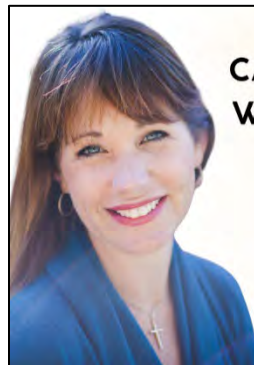
