Isaiah 55:6-9; Philippians 1:20c-24,27a;
 Matthew 20:1-16a

Remember that a parable is a riddle, a story with an intriguing or strange twist. Parables usually have something out-of-the-ordinary or unexpected. The conclusion of today's parable is very unexpected: Those who are hired late in the day get the same pay as those who worked all day long!

This is not a lesson on social justice; it is a lesson on God's gracious invitation to all people to be saved. God called the Hebrews (Israelites, Jews) to be his special people; he called them early. He called the Gentiles (non-Jews) last of all. But he offers all the reward of eternal life.

Very likely, Matthew wrote this parable in the context of his Church community in which there were many Jewish Christians. They were "first," so they thought that they should always have the place of honor and prestige – the important posts in the Church.

The parable reminds everyone that we are equal in God's eyes; God is generous to all; those who come last will enjoy the same joy as those who enter first; no one can claim a special place from God.

The first reading reminds us that God's ways are not like our ways. We operate on the profit motive and on merit. God operates out of his infinite lovingkindness and mercy. God is merciful to all.

Today we begin using Philippians as our first reading. This is a friendly letter written by Paul from his imprisonment at Ephesus around 58 A.D. He thanks the Philippians for sending him aid. He is not discouraged over his imprisonment; he says that it does not matter where he is – alive or dead – as long as he serves the Lord.

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25TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The readings this weekend remind us that God's ways are not our ways, and His thoughts are not our thoughts. In the Gospel, Jesus tells us the parable of the workers in the vineyard, where those who worked only one hour receive the same wage as those who labored throughout the entire day. At first, this can seem unfair to us, because we naturally measure things by what we believe people deserve. Yet Jesus is teaching us something deeper about the generosity of God.

The Lord does not give His love and mercy according to our calculations; He gives freely, abundantly, and without limit. Perhaps there are times when we look at another person and wonder why God would bless them after the choices they have made, or why someone who came to the faith late in life should receive the same eternal reward as someone who has served God faithfully for many years. The answer is found in the words of Isaiah: "Seek the Lord while he may be found." God's mercy is not something we earn by comparison with others; it is a gift we are invited to receive. Rather than worrying about what others receive, may we be grateful that the Master of the vineyard has called each of us to work in His vineyard and promises to welcome us home.

A couple weeks ago the Quincy Deanery Council of Catholic Women, including our Ladies of St. Francis Solanus, worked to host the Springfield Diocesan Council of Catholic Women.
